MARSHAL'S OFFICE, CITY OF WILMINGTON, N. C.,

June 23d, 1873. To the Citizens of Wilmington:

THE season of the year has arrived when it is usual to adopt more than ordinary sanitary measures, to prevent the introduction and spread of epidemic diseases.

Our city at present is fortunately free from any immediate cause of alarm; yet it is important that energetic measures are adopted by every citizen, by a watchful care ever their premises, and giving assistance to the authorities, in every convenient manner, that the pestilence now in other cities near to us will not cast its gloom over this community. To avert such a disaster and misfortune, it is incumbent on all residents to cheerfully accede to the requests of the city authorities and not await compulsory orders. There are stringent Ordinances which compel all owners or occupants of lots to keep them free from noxious weeds, filth, garbage, or other matter liable to engender disease, with heavy penalties for an infraction of these municipal laws.

I trust that it will not be my unpleasant duty to prosecute any individual for neglect of a duty imposed for personal protection as well as the safety of the entire community. My duty, however, is plain, and should it be necessary, by reason of complaint of Health Officers, or my personal observation, to prosecute any citizen for a neglect of the provisions of the Health Ordinance, it will not be without sufficient cause. The publication and distribution to every household being deemed full notice of the requirements of the law.

To facilitate the removal of waste or offensive matter, all persons are requested to places the same in barrels or boxes, on the street adjoining their permises. By so doing the city carts will be enabled to do a much greater amount of work in removal. It has been the custom on the principal business streets to put store sweepings, papers and waste in the streets: this is prohibited by an ordinance of the city, it also entails a very considerable expense to collect in heaps for removal. Hereafter, barrels or boxes must be used for this purpose, and the carts will promptly remove the contents of the same. The carts will remove trash off at any time, but more especially on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays. Weeds may be thrown on the streets in heaps or piles, and will be removed at once, but other collected matter must be in barrels or boxes. Disinfectants may be had on application

at the Marshal's office, furnished by the city to all citizens, free of expense. The Health Officers, who are for convenience charged with receiving complaints from citizens and instructed to visit the premises of all persons to report on the condition of the same, are designated by a yellow rosette worn outside of the coat. To avoid the complaints of one citizen against another, the Health Officers are especially charged with making complaints upon information furnished by citizens. Complaints may also be made at my office, when not more convenient to make the same to a Health Officer. Any person wanting the scavenger cart to visit his premises may netify the Health officers or send word to this office and the same will be attended to at once. If any Health Officer shall neglect to make complaint at the request of any citizens and fail to bring notice of such camplaint before the Mayor or myself, it shall be deemed sufficient cause for his suspension, and any complaint neglected or not fully attended to will be a sufficient cause to bring the officer before the

Mayor for hearing. With the full co-operation of our citizens aided by the enforcement of the law against the careless and indifferent, it is to be hoped that our city may be freed from the calamity GEO. W. PRICE, JR., Preset time. City Marshal.
