# LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

NEW YORK, June \$5. A Tribune special, dated Long Branch, June 24th, says that the President, accompanied by Thomas Murphy, left here to-day for Washington. He was visited last evening by several gentlemen, who urged the removal of Mr. Richardson from the Treasury Department, and it is known that Wall street is making a determined effort to induce the President to make this change

D. Morgan is urged for the succession. These facts, and others that cannot now be given, induce well informed men here to be-lieve that the President's visit to Washing-ton at this time has reference to this subject.

Persons who have spoken to the President lately on this matter, say that while he did not declare his intention of making a speedy charge in the Treasury Department, they left his presence with the belief that his decision was made to do so.

It is also ascertained that the official life Minister Jay will terminate upon the close of the Vienna exposition. He has long been marked by the President for removal and he would have been displaced several months ago, but for the fact of his long residence in Vienna seemed to furnish sufficient reason to the administration for retaining him and his experience during such an important period.

# MASSACHUSETTS.

BOSTON, June 25. The "Neerology" of Harvard College gives the number of deaths during the past year at 59. The Nestor of Harvard College now is H. Binney of Philadelphia, who is 93 years old, and graduated in 1798. The next on the lisl is Judge Willard Hall, who graduated in 1799, and is 93 years old.
