Without going into details, we would merely remark that the fishing interest is superior to all others in this county. Carteret is nearly one hundred miles long; and besides the rivers and bays which penetrate her interior, she has a water front her entire length, or very nearly so. It would be a task which we cannot assume at present, to enumerate all the varieties of fish caught in these waters; hence we shall confine ourself to those which are chiefly known in the market.

The staple fish, and that which is, pying about thirty minutes in its delivperhaps, most widely known, is the Mullet. It should be generally known by all dealers, that Beaufort is the headquarters of the Mullet trade; hence, those who wish to get these fish in their most delicate state, should order from some responsible house in our town. Our dealers get them from first hands soon after they are caught, and we may therefore saiely assert, that they enjoy facilities for supplying the demand in the up-country, which should entitle them to the first consideration at the hands of those who wish to trade in this commodity. Next in importance comes the Speckled Trout. The remarks above apply with equal force to this variety as a market for this choice of fish, and we need not repeat them. We might go on and tell of our Sheep-Head, Spots, Hog-fish, Blue fish and last but not least, of our Drums-thousands of dollars could be made if a Drum Fishery was established here; they are much finer than the Cod fish, and could be sold twenty five per cent. less. Our facilities for an Oyster Canning establishment is unsurpassed.

There are other varieties of fish caught in our waters, but time would fail us to enumerate them all, and so we stop right bere with the remark, that this is no market for either Herrings or White Sand.
