A Freak of Nature-Wondrous Effects of Indian Turnip ... A Remark able Bearded Boy Developed Like

From a gentleman who recently visited the 50,000 Certificates will be Issued house of the father of the boy, and saw him with his own eyes, we learn the following particulars : James Williams, a well-to-do farmer, who resides twelve miles east by south of Salem, has a boy who will be three years old on the 11th of October next. The child is very healthy, and well formed in every respect, except his weight is seventy-five pounds, a little above the average. -When about one year of age this child began to develop rapidly, and now presents the appearance of a man. Upon the face are long black whiskers and moustache of remarkably thrifty growth and fineness of texture. The back and breast of the child are covered with silken black hair from two to three

inches in length. The child has good health and is very intelligent. The face wears as thoughtful an expression as that of a man of mature years, and is withal quite hand. some, were it not that the cheeks puff out too much, thereby detracting from its beauty. Our informant says be never saw such a wonderful sight in his lite, and states that those who live near Mr. Williams and see the child almost daily vet look upon the little one in perfect

amazemeut. In making inquiry as to how this freak of rature was accounted for, the mother of the child stated that when he was in his first year he got hold of an Indian turnip and eat it up. This vegetable is a very powerful astringent, and the physican in attendance at the time is said to have worked a whole day to counteract its influence. From this time the child commenced the development now accomplished, and to this Indian turnin is attributed the result above described.— As we are not skilled in materia medica, we do not give an opinion, although what Indian turnip had to do with this case we cannot conceive. July 17th, 1873. An Ordinance concerning the Paving of Princess Street.

BE it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the city of Wilmington, as follows:

Bec. 1st. That the Mayor be, and is hereby empowered and directed, to contract for the paving of Princess street, with cobble stones, from Water street to Front street, and that from Water street to Front street, and that the contractors be required to enter into bonds, with approved security, for the faithful performance et said contract.

Sec. 2. Beit further ordained, that Alexander Strausz, Dr. W. W. Harriss, and Daniel A. Smith, freeholders of this city, are hereby nominated and appointed a committee on behalf of the city to ascertain the benefits to the proprietors of lots or property on said street; and that the proprietors of lots on said street be notified in writing of the passage of this ordinance, to the end that

street; and that the proprietors of lots on said street be notified in writing of the passage of this ordinance, to the end that they may, in their behalf, appoint three other freeholders of said city, who together with the three freeholders above named appointed on behalf of the city, shall view the lots on said streets and the improvements when made thereon, under this ordinance, and assess the said lots in due ratio to their increased value, and in case the proprietors of said lots shall fail to appoint said freeholders after ten days notice in writing, and in that case the freeholders appointed by this Board shall act as said committee, and view and assess the lots as aforesaid and make report to this Board as is prescribed by the 6th section of act of General Assembly of this State, entitled an act to empower the Commissioners of the town of Milmington to establish streets in said town, and for other purposes. Patified 16th day of January, 1855, by virtue of which said act this ordinance is passed.

Bec 3d, Be it further ordained, That any ordinance, or part thereof, conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
