EDITORIAL BUDGET.

Jules Janin, the distinguished litterateur, is seriously ill.

The reorganization of the army in Catalonia is actively going on.

All Spanish officers refusing to take their posts in the army are to be tried by court-martial.

A dispatch from Madrid says the Intransigentes have sent commissions into the provinces to incite insurrections among the soldiers.

The London Observer says the current report that Ayrton, late commissioner of public works, is to succeed Mousell, Postmaster General, is untrue.

The Independence Belye pronounces as unfounded the reports that Austria had directly or indirectly interfered in negotiations with Count de Chambord.

William W. Clark, formerly Professor of Natural Science in the State Normal School at Albany, died at Rochester, N. Y., Sunday morning, aged 49. In 1849 he assisted in making the State geological survey, and in 1852 made a similar survey in North Carolina with Professor Emmons, of Albany.

After carefully comparing and reviewing the estimates of the loss by the Portland fire, it was put at about \$600,000, as follows: Damages to Galt's wharf, \$100,000; buildings on it, \$10,000; elevator, \$50,000; contents of elevator, \$25,000; coal on Galt's wharf, \$25,000; steamer Dirigo, \$100,000; steamer Montreal, \$140,000; steamer Carlotta, \$50,000; Atlantic wharf and buildings, \$40,000; coal on it, \$1,000; wood on it, \$500.

The total freight on board the three steamers and in the three sheds, and in the storehouses, \$10,000. Two cars loaded with linseed oil, \$7,000; Neal's rigging loft, \$1,000; Stewart's stores of the steam packet company, \$3,000; private property of one hundred and fifty employes on the boats, \$3,750. Total, \$549,750. This leaves \$50,250 for errors and omissions.

The cells of a large number of buildings were flooded. The aggregate loss is several thousand dollars. The stable of George Sheets was struck by lightning, and a valuable mare was killed. The schooner Leonidas, Captain David Howard, was also struck by lightning during the storm, and her mainmast shattered. The box factory of S. Grabe & Co., on West Falls avenue and Lombard street, was struck by lightning, entailing a loss of \$2,000.

AN ORDINANCE,

CONCERNING BILGE WATER. The Board of Aldermen of the City of Wilmington, N. C., Do ORDAIN, That it shall not be lawful for any ship, vessel, boat, steamboat, or any other craft in the Cape Fear river to pump or discharge any bilge water within the limits of the city, between the hours of 4 o'clock A. M., and 10 o'clock P. M., without permission from the City Marshal or Harbor Master.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall violate this ordinance, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding Fifty Dollars, at the discretion of the Mayor.

Sec. 3. Any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting, are hereby repealed.

The above ordinance was passed by the Board of Aldermen at their meeting, August 5th, 1873.
