1st. All vessels from Ports South of Cape Fear will come to at the Visiting Station near "Deep Water Point," and await the inspection of the Quarantine Physician. 2d. All vessels having sickness on board on arrival, or having had sickness during

the Port from whence they sailed.

the voyage, are required to come to the

3d. Vessels not included as above will proceed to Wilmington without detention. 4th. Pilots are especially enjoined to make careful enquiry, and if not satisfied with the statements of the Captain, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition, they will bring the vessel to the Station for further

examination. 5th. Pilots wilfully violating the Quarantine laws are subject to forfeiture of their branch. Masters of vessels to a fine of Two Hundred (\$200) Dollars a day for every day they violate the Quarantine laws, and all other persons are liable for each and every
