

The Whipping Post.

In one of the Middle States on last Wednesday, four bank robbers were publicly whipped in accordance with the judgment of a court. The report says that a crowd of about two thousand persons were present, who were much disappointed because the lash was too lightly laid on. Nevertheless, they found some satisfaction in jeering the victims, who were much mortified there-

While offenders should be punished both as a matter of justice to themselves, and as an example to others, degradation should not accompany punishment except in cases where the criminals occupy official position. Delaware has no reason to be proud of the event which came off at New Castle on the 10th, and the sooner she abolishes the whipping post, the better for the reputation of her jurisprudence and civilization.

Beligerent Rights to Cuba.

Among the projects to realize the ultimate acquisition of Cuba by the United States, is to concede beligerent rights to the insurrectionists of that Island, who are in arms against the Spanish government. We say acquisition of Cuba, for it is our conviction that the exasperation against Spain is indissolubly twisted with a desire to possess the gem of the American seas For those beligerent rights a preliminary step towards our conquest, the united voice of the people has gone to the Capitol. The introduction of resolutions looking to that recognition has taken place, and at the proper time the subject will be considered and disposed

War with the Spanish authorities of the Island, or a recognition of the insurrectionists, mean Cuban annexation, or a free Republic under the protection of the United States. It is undeniable that such a consummation is much to be wished. The civilized world knows that any government which is administered by civil authority would be preferable to the military force which now and for a long time past has controlled the Island. There ought not to be a person in this country so ignorant as not to know that the time for a final determination has come. The issue is fairly before Congress, and to ignore it would be to disappoint the hopes of every friend of humanity on earth.

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
