

CONCERNING PAVING ON CHESTNUT  
STREET WITH COBBLE STONE.

THE Board of Aldermen of the city of  
Wilmington, N. C., do

ORDAIN, That that portion of Chestnut  
street, between the western line of Front  
street and the river, be paved with cobble  
stone, and when the work shall have been  
completed, the Mayor shall cause an assess-  
ment of the real property along said street  
and the vicinity thereof, to defray the ex-  
pense of said pavement, in whole or in part,  
as is provided by law.

All ordinances, or parts thereof, conflicting  
with the above ordinance are hereby re-  
pealed.
