AT HOME.

Cotton Blooms. We received on Thursday morning last, cotton blooms from Messrs. Barefoot and Brother, and B. H. Baridin, Esq., which were the first reported for the county, we believe.

Miss Mary J. Bynum also presents us with a bloom, which opened on her farm at White Oak, on Saturday last. This latter, we think, deserves special mention, from the fact that the crop from which it comes, is being raised on the farm and under the special superintendence of one of Wilson's most accomplished and refined daughters.

From the farms mentioned above, and other sections of this and adjoining counties, we hear glowing accounts of the cotton crop. The weed has grown wonderfully in the past two weeks.

Foy's School.

The seventh session of this well known School, located near Stantonburg, will open August 24, 1899, and continue twenty weeks. There was a large attendance of pupils during the past session; and the patrons of the School were unanimous in praise of the system of instruction pursued and the discipline enforced, and were proud of the progress made by their children and wards.

We are pleased to learn that the question of erecting a substantial and handsome Academy building, for the use of Mr. Foy's School, is being agitated by the good people of Stantonburg neighborhood. We are sure that it would be money well invested.

The Swiss Emigrants—Marriage at the Depot on arrival.

Some sixty Swiss emigrants, brought over through the Agency of the Eastern North Carolina Immigration Association, arrived at Goldsboro, on Friday last, and were distributed principally to the Counties of Wilson, Edgecombe and Pitt, Wilson receiving about half the lot. Those for this county arrived here on Saturday, and were distributed between Messrs. Wm. Barnes, Jr., Wm. Woodard, Wm. C. Ellis, and Sam. B. Farmer.

We learn that soon after their arrival here on Saturday, the rites of matrimony were solemnized between three couples, by a Justice of the Peace; and as the parties were unable to speak English, it was only by the intervention of an interpreter that they were declared "man and wife." The ceremony was performed at Lutt's Hotel, near the Depot, in the presence of quite a large crowd. May prosperity be the reward of their coming to our county, and happiness follow their new relation in life.

Excursion to the Seashore.
