Nominations for Township Officers. The Fall Session of this School, situated near Ruffin Station, on the Piedmont Railroad, will commence on Monday, July 31st, 1899.

The subscriber has hitherto had a quiet and pleasant school, therefore he does not wish to tarnish the reputation of his present pupils by receiving bad boys, but good ones solicited.

Terms, per Session Twenty-One Weeks. ENGLISH GRAMMAR—The equivalent of Fifteen Dollars in Specie.

LANGUAGES—The equivalent of Twenty-Five Dollars in Specie. If the Tuition be paid in currency, the addition shall not exceed thirty-five cents on each dollar of specie, and if it be paid at the commencement of the session a deduction of ten per cent shall be made.

Four barrels of good corn, delivered at the commencement of the Session, will pay for the instruction of a pupil in English Grammar.

Six barrels will pay for the instruction of one in Languages. Mained soldiers shall pay only two-thirds of the ordinary prices of Tuition. No other deduction except in cases of protracted sickness.

Board, exclusive of light, can be obtained for one barrel of family flour per month, or \$12.50 in currency. During the first three days of the Session, pupils can get conveyance from the Station, free of charge. Patrons are requested to visit the School frequently, in order to see how their children progress. The society is good, and the location healthy.

EDUCATIONAL. CIRCULAR.

The Seventh Session of J. H. FOY'S SCHOOL, at Stantonburg, Wilson Co., N. C., opens August 2nd, 1899, and continues twenty weeks.

COURSE—English, Classical and Mathematical with French and Natural Science. The following are some of the distinguishing features of this School:

FIRST.—It is an inflexible rule (and to carry it out fully disciplinary measures of a stringent character will be resorted to) that no child or adolescent student shall be admitted to the school unless he has failed that every pupil, large or small, male or female, must make decided and sensible improvement.

SECOND.—In Elementary Mathematics pupils are subjected to a rigid daily drill in the most exhaustive works on Mental Arithmetic and Mental Algebra now before the public. This method of instruction throws a vast amount of labor upon the teacher, but is of incalculable benefit to the learner, who, under patient and thorough culture, will, in a surprisingly short time, learn how to use his faculties in the investigation and resolution of difficulties. He who has learned to think, is already more than half educated.

THIRD.—Particular attention will be paid to studies having a practical bearing—not, however, to the neglect of those of a more scholarly character. In Latin, Greek and French (in addition to the customary translations from text books) daily written exercises, with syntactical citations for all constructions, will be required from advanced pupils.

FOURTH.—After having used up the Preparatory Course, students will be allowed to select a college curriculum, but from such, in consequence of their great draught upon the teachers time, double rates of tuition will invariably be required.

FIFTH.—Regular and Rigid Public Examinations every month, at which the standing of each pupil for the preceding month, &c. the number and quality of his recitations will be read out, and a written report of same transmitted by mail to parent or guardian.

SIXTH.—In order to develop and encourage an spirit of emulation, a liberal share of the income of the School will be applied each session to the purchase of suitable medals or other prizes for distribution among those pupils who, in the judgment of a competent Board of Visitors, shall sustain the most creditable examinations. Certificates of merit will be awarded to those who, without distinguishing themselves in the entire course, display conspicuous merit in one or more departments of study.

SEVENTH.—Great care will be taken that the discipline shall not be resolutely stern. Courtesy to teachers and fellow pupils, diligence in study, together with decorous conduct in school and out, are demanded by the Regulations of the School. In the suppression of idleness or vice, before resorting to harsh measures, the Principal has been in the habit of thoroughly exhausting all means of a kind and persuasive character. His experience goes to prove that in the majority of cases Love is a more efficacious means of government than Fear, whatever other educators may think.

EIGHTH.—In the amount of study exacted from each pupil, due regard will be paid to age, constitution, state of health, &c. Pupils at a distance may rest assured that constant and vigilant supervision will be exercised over the health and morals of their children.

NINTH.—No money will be taken from any pupil attending the Public Examinations, shall fail to be perfectly satisfied with the progress of his child or ward. This feature is honestly incorporated as a guarantee of hard work on the part of both instructors and the instructed.

TENTH.—A Literary Society will be fostered by the Principal, and all pupils of sufficient advancement will be required to participate in its discussions and exercises.
