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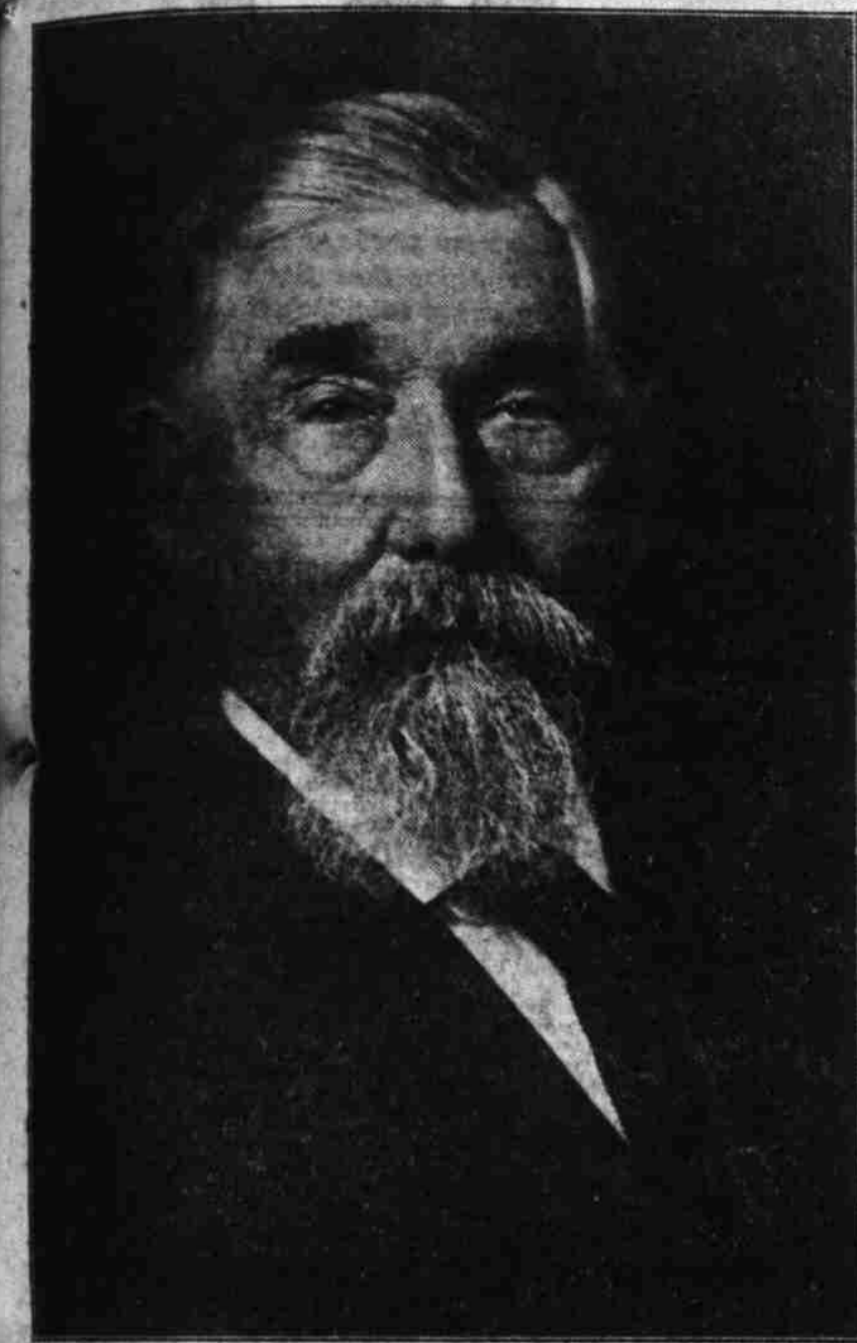

WORD OF INVITATION FROM STATE CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS.

To the Republicans of North Carolina:
In the name of the City of Winston-Salem, regardless of party, I want to extend a most hearty invitation to the Republican delegations to our Convention on April 12th, and to assure them of a most cordial welcome and a pleasant time. And right here, I want to say the Convention will be called to order at 11:00 o'clock instead of 12:00, as all the trains will be in by that time and it may possibly give us time for some of the delegates to get off on the evening trains if pressed for time.

Speakers of note have been invited to be with us on that day and we have every assurance that they will be here, and we will do our best to make this occasion both profitable and entertaining.

Brethren, I am anxious for as many delegates to come as possible. I want our people to see the class of men that constitute the Republican Party, for I am sure no party has been less understood or more unjustly abused than the Republican Party of North Carolina. We have been regarded by many as the enemies of good government, men who would despoil the State for the sake of office. Our motives have been misunderstood, our acts unfairly criticized, our history misrepresented; in fact, every method to discredit our party, that the fertile brain of the Democratic leaders could invent, has been resorted to.

Now, brethren, I want the people of North Carolina to become better acquainted with our party. I want them to understand that we are as loyal to the State of North Carolina as any party has ever been, that we want to carry North Carolina not for the offices, not as a matter of reprisal or revenge on the Democratic Party, for those are the lowest and most unworthy motives that could move us, but our desire to win should be to reduce the burden of taxation, promote efficiency and economy in office, to pass liberal and progressive laws that will invite both labor and capital to come and make their homes with us.

There is no question that in certain parts of North Carolina the people were never less able to pay their taxes than to-day and yet their taxes were never heavier. We see meetings are being held in various counties of the State, protesting against conditions that are upon us at this time. These conditions affect all alike, both Democrats and Republicans. Then why should not all good citizens get together and, forgetting all past party differences, join in nominating the very best men, regardless of party, especially for the Legislature and elect them. There are certain State obligations we cannot get from under, but we can certainly cut down many expenses that are not fixed, abolish many useless offices and stop the continual issue of State bonds.

Brethren, come and let us council together, and if possible, go home resolved to be better and more useful citizens than we have ever been.

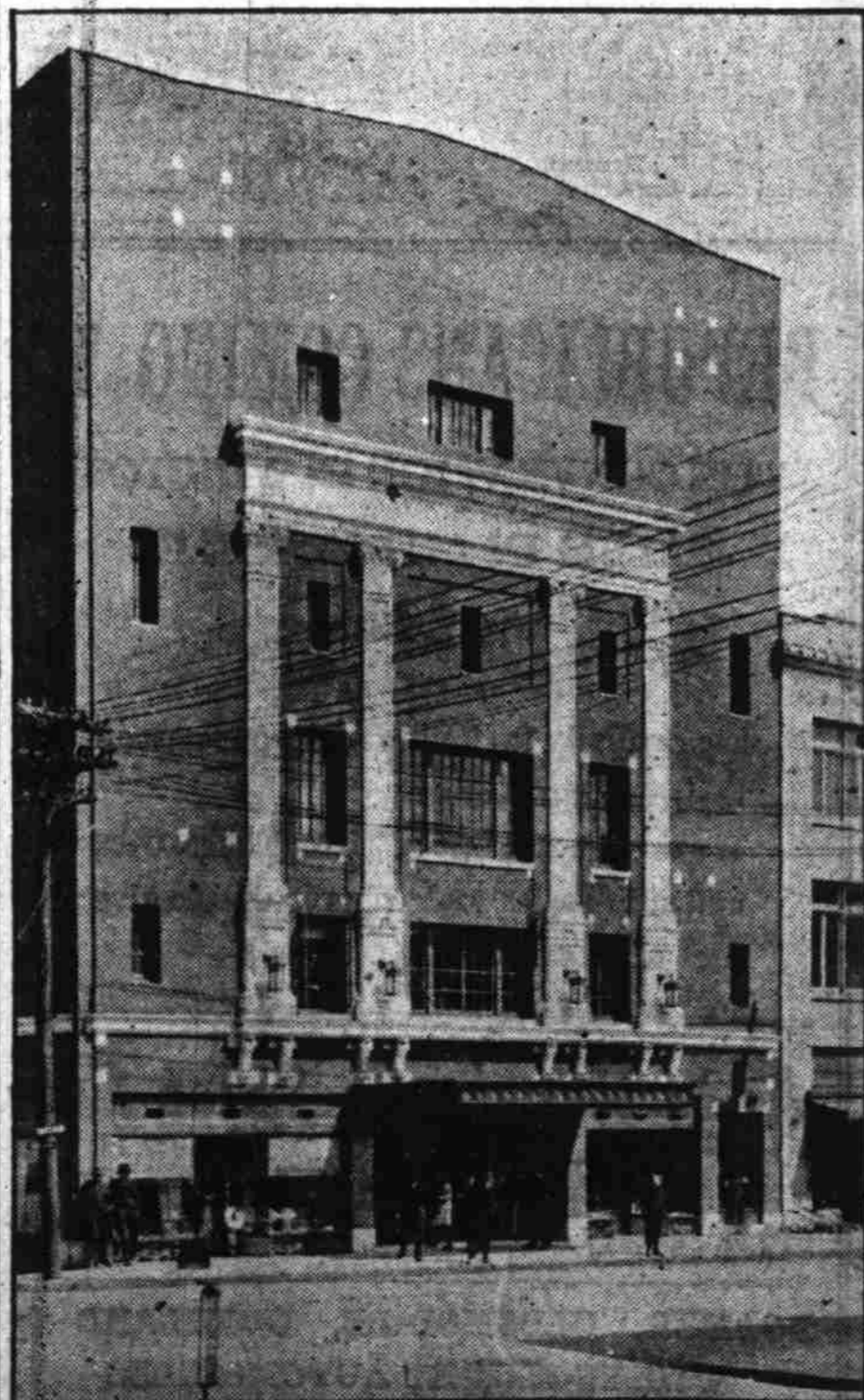
