CONGRESS.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Tuesday, January 2.

The Speaker laid before the house a letter from the secretary of war, transmitting reports showing the number of soldiers recruited during the year 1820—the fund from which the expenses of recruiting have been paid, &c. prepared in obedience to a resolution of his house; which letter and report were ordered to be on the table.

Mr. Burwell offered the following resolution, which was, on motion of Mr. Smith of Md. with the consent of the mover of it, laid on the table for the present.

Resolved, That the select committee, to whom a message of the president, transmitting an account of the expenditures of the commissioners under the 5th, 6th, and 7th article of the treaty of Ghent, for designating the northern boundary line of the United States, was referred, be instructed to report a bill fixing the salaries of the commissioners and agents, employed in that service.

On motion of Mr. Hill, it was

Resolved, That the committee on ways and means be instructed to enquire into the expediency of making provision by law for the compensation of persons employed in transmitting to congress the votes for president and vice president.

The following message was received from the president of the United States by Mr. Gouverneur, his private secretary:

To the House of Representatives:

In compliance with a resolution of the house of representatives, of the 22d of November last, "enquiring the president to inform that house, what naval force has been stationed, for the protection of the commerce of our citizens, in the West India islands and parts adjacent, during the present year, and whether any deprivations, by pirates or others, upon the property of citizens of the United States, engaged in such commerce, have been reported to our government," I now submit, for the information of the house, a report from the secretary of the navy, with accompanying documents, which contain all the information in the possession of the government required by that resolution.

The message being read was, with the documents, laid on the table and ordered to be printed.

On motion of Mr. Hall, of N. Y. it was

Resolved, That the committee on commerce be instructed to enquire into the expediency of erecting a light-house at the mouth of the Oswego river, on the shore of Lake Ontario.

On motion of Mr. Cook, it was

Resolved, That the committee of ways and means be instructed to enquire into the expediency of requiring every class of public officers charged either with the collection or disbursement of the public money to settle their accounts within specified periods, under the penalty of absolutely forfeiting their respective appointments.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Rich, of Vermont, instructing the committee of manufactures to enquire into the expediency of prohibiting, after certain periods, the importation, except for the export trade, of distilled spirits and malt liquors; manufactures of wool; cotton and flaxen goods; glass wares and window glass; iron, in bars, rods, sheets, castings, spikes and nails, and manufactures of sheet iron; manufactures of lead, copper, or tin; all descriptions of paper; and manufactures of leather; and also instructing the committee to enquire into the expediency of levying an excise duty upon the domestic articles which shall be substituted for those, the importation of which shall be prohibited: the excise to take effect simultaneous with prohibition.

Mr. Storrs, after referring to the documents to show that an agent had been employed in one of the commissions under the British treaty, although the appropriation was withheld by congress at the last session, in order to abolish the agency, moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the committee on the expenditures in the department of state be instructed specially to enquire whether any moneys have been disbursed through that department, or authorized to be disbursed, on account of any salary or compensation to an agent or acting agent or any person employed in that capacity on the part of the United States, during the year 1820, under the 6th or 7th articles of the late treaty of peace with Great Britain; and, if any moneys have been so paid, to inquire and report to the house by authority of what law, and out of what appropriation the same has been paid.

And, the question being taken on agreeing to the resolution, it was agreed to without opposition.

Mr. Warfield submitted for consideration the following resolution:

Resolved, That 5,000 copies of the letter from the comptroller of the treasury transmitting a list of balances on the books of the second and third auditors of the treasury which have remained more than three years prior to the 30th Sept. 1820, a list of the names of persons who have failed to render their accounts to the said auditors within the year, and a list of advances made prior to the 3d March, 1809, by the war department, which remained to be accounted for on the books of the third auditor of the treasury on the 30th Sept. 1820, be printed for the use of the members of this house.

This resolution was supported by Mr. Warfield and opposed by Mr. Smith, of Maryland; but at the suggestion of Mr. Lowndes, the resolution was laid on the table, with a view of seeing whether such a discrimination or classification of the cases might be made as to show distinctly the class or cases remaining unsettled from circumstances separately from that of actual defalcation.

MILITARY EXPENDITURES.

The house then resolved itself into a committee of the whole, Mr. Allen, of Massachusetts, in the chair, on the bill making partial appropriations for the support of the military establishment for the year 1821.

There was a desultory conversation on the details of the bill, the result was, that the bill was ordered to be engrossed for a third reading without serious opposition.

Wednesday, January 3.

The resolution yesterday submitted by Mr. Burwell, directing an enquiry into the expediency of fixing by law the salaries of the persons attached to the commissions under the treaty of Ghent, &c. and that submitted by Mr. Smith, of Maryland, calling for certain information, were agreed to.

The house proceeded to consider the bill in addition to the several acts making provision for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war; and

Mr. Hardin moved to amend it by adding to it the following sections:

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That no prisoner under the aforesaid acts shall be stricken from the rolls, who upon giving in the schedule of his property as is therein directed, shall be worth less, after deducting his debts, than — dollars.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That every pensioner who has, under the act of the 1st of May, 1820, been stricken again on the pension roll, if application shall be made by him, if, upon examining his schedule, he is worth less than — dollars.

And, debate arising thereon, the bill was again ordered to lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. Baldwin, it was

Resolved, That the committee on commerce be instructed to enquire whether, in their opinion, any further measures are necessary to be adopted for the due enforcement of the existing revenue laws.

Resolved, That the committee of commerce be instructed to enquire into the expediency of making any alteration in the existing laws which relate to the verification of invoices, or to manifests of goods imported from foreign parts.

Resolved, That the committee of commerce be instructed to enquire into the expediency of making any provision by law for the due enforcement of the provisions of the act, entitled "an act supplementary to an act, entitled an act to regulate the collection of duties on imports and tonnage," passed the 2d day of March, 1799.

Resolved, That the committee of ways and means be instructed to enquire and to report to this house, whether, in their opinion, the permanent revenue is adequate to meet the expenses of this government.

Resolved, That the committee of ways and means be instructed to enquire whether any measures may, in their opinion be necessary to increase the revenue, and if so, to report the measures to this house.

Resolved, That the committee of ways and means be instructed to enquire into the expediency of prohibiting or imposing additional duties on the importation of foreign spirits, and imposing an excise on domestic distilled spirits.

On motion of Mr. Cook, the house proceeded to consider his motion, submitted on the 26th ult. for calling for a statement of the land warrants issued, and yet to be issued, to soldiers of the late war, &c.—but, after some debate between Messrs. Cook and Rhea, the house refused to agree to the resolution.

Mr. Warfield submitted for consideration
