NORTH CAROLINA. Sketches of a Tour in the West and South, made in the winter of 1833-34.

DEAR SIR—North Carolina is to be ranked among the largest of the states in our Union, containing, as it does, 49,560 square miles.

The middle and western parts of this state are hilly and much of the last part even mountainous. The Blue Ridge, a range of the Alleghany mountains, runs through the western part of the state.

This state possesses no very good harbors; those of Newbern and Wilmington are the best. The inlets to the sound which line the coast of this state are so shallow to admit large vessels.

No state in our Union has a finer climate than that of North Carolina. It is true that the low marshy lands near the coast and the sounds, in its eastern part, are unhealthy to those who have not been accustomed to live among them.

There is no large city in this state, nor any great commercial emporium of trade. The inhabitants of the western part trade with Charleston, Augusta &c.

very pleasant village in this state. Raleigh the capital, is one of the most beautiful cities in the north...

The population of this state was in 1830, 638,887, of which number 414,264 were whites, and 229,333 were colored.

No provision has yet been made by the legislative authority for the education of the people in common schools, save that a school fund, amounting in November 1832, to \$88,156 had been accumulated.

The efforts of your society to plant Sunday schools in this state cannot but do much good, if they be judiciously carried on, and long enough sustained.

The early history of this state is full of interest. Who can read without feeling the melancholy tale of Raleigh and his vigorous and persevering but still unsuccessful efforts to plant colonies in this soil?

In the western counties of this state are numerous and valuable gold mines, as you know. A very large amount of gold is annually obtained from these mines.

A Sunday school establishment, a few years ago near Charlotte, by a pious young lady from Charleston, was found to be more salutary in its influence upon the parents than any thing else that has been attempted.

The literary institutions of this state are the following: 1. The University of North Carolina, at Chapel Hill, 28 miles northwest from Raleigh.
