

**A Travelling Post Office.**—In the mail train of cars by the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Rail Road, there is a handsome car, which is divided into two commodious apartments, one of which is a complete post office, furnished with a desk, pigeon-holes, cases, a letter box, and every thing needful for the business of a post office. This apartment is occupied by a clerk or agent of the Post Office Department—who receives the letters which are put into the box at the different towns on the route, stamps them, charges them, arranges them in parcels, and delivers them at the places of their destinations. In this mode, the way-mails are accommodated and distributed with a convenience and despatch, unknown in the history of letters and post offices. The apartment in the rear of this travelling post office contains the great mail. Our citizens find a good deal of convenience in the arrangement, and frequently avail themselves of the locomotive post office, when their letters are too late for the hour of the regular establishment in Shipley street. *Del. Jour.*

A resolution passed the last Local Legislature of Maine to pay the members in Gold and Silver. A resolve to repeal the resolve was taken up in the Senate of that State on the 6th inst. and indefinitely postponed by a vote of 13 to 12—all the yeas were Van Buren men—and every Whig voted nay, and two only of the Van Buren members voted with them. In the House, on the 8th, a resolve for the repeal of so much of the resolve requiring payment to members in specie, as relates to members of the House, was passed, 91 to 70—every Whig present voting in the affirmative.

A new state house is in progress of erection at Jefferson, the capital of Missouri, the cost of which is estimated at \$225,000.

The dimensions of the house, 36 by 42 feet, two stories.  
The foundation to be of hewn rock, 2 feet above the surface, with a sufficient projection to prevent any injury from the falling of water off the eaves, with as much of the foundation laid in lime mortar as shall be deemed necessary.  
The pitch of the first story to be 10 feet in the clear, the second course of which is to be laid in lime mortar, and the wall to be 2 feet thick, the lower story to be divided by cross passages into four rooms, with brick walls each room to be finished with a fine plaster.  
The cross passage to be 12 feet in the clear, the passage long ways to be 10 feet.  
The wall of the upper story to be 16 inches thick, totally laid in lime mortar, the pitch of which to be 13 feet in the clear, to be divided into three apartments, two jury rooms 9 feet in the clear, lengthwise, with lathed and plastered partitions, a fireplace in each; and one or two fireplaces to the Court room.  
All the rooms to be ceiled up to the chair mould, and finished with plastering and white wash, except the rooms in the lower story to be ceiled over heads.  
The jury rooms to be furnished with bench seats, and the Court room to be furnished with bench, benches and tables, in such manner and style as the commissioners shall direct.  
Each passage door to be furnished with field glass, and to have 30 windows, 4 ft high 10 ft wide with sash and glass over each passage door.  
The casings and sills of each passage door and all the windows, to be of hewn rock.  
All the doors to be finished with panelled woodwork, and the windows of the lower story with sliding, lined, paneled sash, with the necessary locks and fastenings.  
One 1/2 of a story to be 5 feet in width.  
The boxing and outside consisting to be finished, and an the necessary cornish in the mode furnished.  
All the doors to be furnished with best knob locks.  
All the rooms below to be furnished with suitable desks and tables.  
The sleepers and joists to be 10 by 4, 2 ft from centre to centre. The flooring of quarter plank, 1 1/2 inch.  
The roof to be hipped, well supported and covered with zinc.  
The exterior of the building to be painted, red and pencilled.  
Steps of hewn rock to be furnished each outside door.  
All the wood work belonging to the building to be neatly painted.
