GOOD NEWS FROM ARKANSAS.

The State elections in Arkansas took place on the 7th inst., and if the accounts are correct, have unexpectedly resulted in favor of the Whigs.

FROM MEXICO.

Advices from Vera Cruz to the 30th of September have been received at New Orleans, by way of Havana, from which we learn that Santa Anna has set at liberty the one hundred and four remaining Texan prisoners who were confined at the castle of Perote.

Santa Anna having retired to Manga de Clavo to attend to his private affairs, General Canales, who had been appointed provisional President of the Mexican Republic ad interim, arrived at the city of Mexico on the 9th ultimo, and on the following day entered upon the discharge of the duties of his appointment.

No portion of the news is there any mention made of the preparations against Texas, nor do we learn that the Chambers have taken any further steps towards raising the four millions of dollars voted for the war.

GEORGIA.—An error in our types last week made us give to the Locos in Georgia a majority of 25,000; we meant to say 2,500.

BALTIMORE.—Col. Joseph G. Davis was elected on the 21st inst. Mayor of the city of Baltimore by the Locofoco party, by a majority of 503 votes over James O. Law, esq. the Whig candidate.

How it was done.—A man named David Miller, a resident of the Thirteenth Ward of Baltimore, and a Locofoco, was presented to the Grand Jury on Saturday last, and committed to jail, charged with having "cooped" fourteen men, and with having been instrumental in voting them three times each in all the wards of the city [fourteen].
