THE "N. C. STATE FAIR."

The Chairman of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina State Agricultural Society, in accordance with the directions of the Committee, has prepared the following preliminary notice, which we insert with pleasure. The importance of an early attention to the rules and suggestions contained in it will be obvious to all. The third annual "Fair" of the "N. C. State Agricultural Society," will open at Raleigh on Tuesday, the 16th day of October, and continue four days.

All articles to be exhibited for premiums must be entered and registered by the Monday night immediately preceding the day for opening the Fair. Articles intended for exhibition will be received at any time during the "Fair,"—entirely at the owner's risk.

When stock has been received by the "Reception Committee" and properly registered, it will be kept at the expense of the Society, and like all other articles cannot be removed without permission from the "Ex. Committee."

Exhibitors are earnestly requested to send up their articles early (the preceding week) that they may be properly arranged before the opening of the "Fair."

The annual address before the Society will be delivered by the Hon. Thomas Ruffin on the "Fair Grounds."

I am authorized to state that the "North Carolina," "Wilmington and Weldon," and "Raleigh and Gaston" Railroads will observe the following rules in transporting articles for exhibition at the "State Fair."

Exhibitors will be permitted to pass a single specimen of each of their articles to be exhibited, free of charge.

Five weeks will be carried at half rate of fare, at owner's risk.

Visitors to the "Fair" will be permitted to pass at half rate of "fare" by buying a "Return Ticket" (which will be good for five days) otherwise the usual rate will be charged.

The above rules apply equally to the "Union Fair" to be held at Henderson on the 10th, 11th and 12th of October.

During the "State Fair" extra Trains of Passenger cars will be run on the N. Carolina and Raleigh and Gaston Railroads, by which visitors can attend the Fair in the day, and lodge at night at the various villages along the line of the R.R.s. A schedule will be published, giving notice of the arrival and departure of the extra trains.

LATE FROM EUROPE.
New York, September 27.

The steamer Washington, Capt. Curdery, from Southampton, arrived in-day at 12 o'clock.

The Pacific arrived out at noon on the 15th. On the 8th instant, (Saturday) September, after a terrible bombardment of three days and nights, during which period the French were six times repulsed, and the English once, before the Redan and Malakoff towers, with a combined loss of fifteen thousand men and the most terrible slaughter, the Russians were compelled to evacuate Sebastopol.

tion whether Sebastopol is tenable by the Allies while the Russians remain masters of the forts on the north side, fronting the sea.

It was rumored in the Clubs today that the Allies found twelve hundred guns in Sebastopol; also, that the Russians were falling back on Balaclava. But French rumors say that the Russians will certainly hold the north side of Sebastopol to the last extremity, and that the Allied Admirals have decided that it is inexpedient to enter the harbor of Sebastopol until Fort Constantine is silenced. It is probable that the Allies will attack Fort Constantine from Fort Alexander and Artillery Bay.

The London Times of Friday, September 14, says: "The forts on the north side of the harbor of Sebastopol will enable the Russian army to rest themselves for a few days, but the defenses are inferior to those just evacuated, and supplied with water only by wells." The Times considers it possible that Gortschakoff has decided to retreat to the inland.

Paris letters say that large reinforcements have been ordered to proceed to the Crimea immediately. They also state that the report of the death of Gen. De Salles is doubted. An Aid-de-camp of Prussier was mortally wounded in the battle of the 6th September. The total loss of the French troops in the attack on Sebastopol is not allowed to transport. It is thought that the whole number of French and English killed will amount to not less than ten thousand.

Petersburg, September 24.

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The Russians it is said lost about the same number as the Allies, making a total loss of over thirty thousand men!

The [Russians before evacuating the town, blew up all the fortifications, sunk all the shipping, and fired Sebastopol, leaving nothing behind them but a mighty mass of smoking ruins.

The allied armies lost terribly, and as the French were in the thickest of the fight, much more seriously. They lost five eminent generals—among the number is the gallant General Bouquet.

A large allied force, it is said, were marching to intercept the Russians in their retreat inland. The allies captured immense quantities of materials of war.

It is reported that the Allied Commanders had been ordered to demand an unconditional surrender of all the troops, stars defenses in the Crimea, including Odessa.

It is said another unsuccessful attempt had been made at Paris to assassinate the French Emperor. His failure in many quarters is deeply regretted.

The latest news contained in the London Times of the 15th instant, as telegraphed to Liverpool on that day, is as follows:

It is reported that 25,000 troops have embarked from Balaclava to attack the north side of Sebastopol, and also that the Russians are in full retreat toward Perekop.

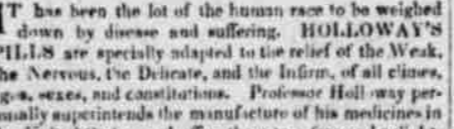
