RAILWAY RESPONSIBILITY.

Two juries of inquest have rendered verdicts in two cases of murder by rail which directly and criminally impeach not only the subordinates directly in charge of the trains on which the murders were done, but the superior officials of the roads on

which they occurred.

In the case of the Oil Creek "disaster," the jury being vested with power under the law of Pennsylvania so to do, have followed up their verdict of inquest by a demand upon the coroner to issue his warrant for the arrest of the President, Directors and Managers of the Oil Creek Railway, as well as the engineer and conductor of the train by the destruction of which the action of the jury was made ne-cessary. In the case of the Long Island "disaster," the jury having fixed gross carelessness and irregularity in the dis-charge of their duties upon Mr. Oliver Charlick, the President of the Long Island Railroad, and upon two of his subordinates, leave the matter therewith in the hands of the prosecuting attorney, whose duty it now becomes to bring these persons before the grand jury for manslaughter. It is not less important to the officials of our railways themselves than to the public that this should he done. That things should go on as they have for some time past been going on our railways, is clearly impossible. People will not tamely submit forever to be robbed every day and murdered once a week by persons whose business it is to carry the public from place to place, and who get well paid for doing that husiness. Americans, as a rule, can be more easily swindled and more safely knocked on the head, it would seem, than men of any other civilized nation; but even Americans will not put up with everything and forever. If the law is potent to punish dishonesty and scandalous deceliction of duty in the managers and directors of railways, and if this chastising power of the law can be fairly and firmly exercised in cases so aagrant as these which have just come before the public, the else inevitable applidation of Judge Lynch's summary code to the parties whom the people may choose to regard as responsible will be averted by the becoming chastisement of those whom the law shall pronounce really to be respon-N. Y. World.

IMPORTANT RAILROAD DECISION. On an appeal from a lower court, the Ken-

tucky court of appeals, Judge Roberson presiding, has just rendered a decision, in the case of the Louisville and Nashville railroad company vs. J. Collins, one of its employees, who, through the carelessness of the engineer, lost one of his legs, whilst in the immediate execution of an order from that engineer-which decision is of much interest to all railroads. The court held the following:

1. A railroad is responsible to one of its employees for any damage sustained by the gross negligence of any other employee of

the road.

2. A railroad is responsible to persons occupying the attitude of strangers, for damages sustained by the ordinary negligence of the agents of the road.

3. One who is employed to load railroad ties on a construction train must be regarded in law as a stranger to the road, and the road is liable to him for damages sustained by the negligence of the engineer.

4. The old English law relieving a railroad from all liability for injuries received by the employees of the road, and requiring employees to take the risk of each other's gross negligence, is not the law in Kentucky.

5. An engineer is the lawful agent of the road, and the road will be held responsible for his gross and ordinary negligence upon the usual principles of agency.
