They were suddenly astonished and alarmed at first by what appeared to be a column of fire about fifteen feet in height, bursting from the basement of the tenement mentioned, and rushing down the street at a fearful speed, accompanied by the most appalling screams, which appeared to issue from the very bosom of the burning shaft. The howling man of flame sped down the street, like an omen of death, for nearly an entire block, swaying to and fro, and finally falling to the ground. The police then became aware that the flaming column was a burning man, whose clothes had taken fire from the explosion of a kerosene lamp, occasioned by carelessness, in the basement of No. 482 Eighth Avenue. The unfortunate man (Antoine Reich) was cared for, but it is not expected that he can recover. Two others, the proprietor and a man named George Delfman, were also dreadfully burned.
