OBITUARY.

.Captain Silas M. Link departed this life on the night of the 24th of Jan. at the residence of his son in law Dr. W. R Hughes, in Durbam at the advanced age of 73 years.

The memory of a man of the life and character of Silas M. Link, deserves more than this simple notice, on the part of the immediate community in which he lived-it is due to his family and descendants and is of value to the community. Mr. Link was a man of tine intellect, his mind was of an accute investigating character which refused to accept dogmas without inquiry. He was fond of reading and became unusually well informed. He delighted especially in old books old sayings and old time virtues, and acquired much curious information from distinguished authors of the olden

He took a deep interest in polities always acted with the conservative party, but re-served the right to himself of cutertaining his own independent opinions,

No man more admired lofty bearing, commanding talents, and eloquence in political aders, and he gloried in the fame of the range tounty in having had an unbroken line of such public men in all his day, passing down in uninterrupted succession from the days of James Mebane, Duscan Cameron and Archibald D. Murphy to the pres-

He distinctly foresaw and foretold the inevitable rupture of our political system and prudently provided against one of its evils by parting with his slaves years ugo, which he did in a humane manner,

Mr. Link maintained a high moral character, without stain or reproach through tife. He was just and upright in all his dealings, and faithfully and well seted his part in all the relations of life, as cicigen, eighbour, husband, parent and master.

Early in life he was elected county surveyer, and eminently qualified himself for the discharge of its duties, and deservedly rose to high distinction in that line, He retained the office until a few years since, when he voluntarily gave it up. And although the county was divided and two surveyors were appointed for Orange in place of one, and Mr. Link would not go out in bad weather or into the woods if the wind was blowing at all, and his fees were smal. and he would not take one cent more than the law allowed him, the amount of work done by him may be estimated by the fact that he had received \$10,000 made up of these small fees. He made himself by diligent preparatory study, & with professional aid familiar with the law of North Carolina relating to Boundaries, Descents und Registration, and owned and profitably read the leading decisions of the Supreme Court on each subjects; and was himself an

excellent conveyancer.

He was often examined in court as a witness in Land suits and in giving in his testimony exhibited in a remarkable manner his conscientions and scrupulous regard for the exact trath and his detestation of falsebood or prevarieation.

From his life and conversation Captain Link, might at all times have been taken for a Christian and in his last illness declared that for forty years he had tried to serve tiod, but felt too unworthy to declare his name or enter his church. And in cerms of the riches consolation and comfort to his family and friends abundantly declared his faith in salvation only through the merits of his Saviour Jesus Christ, and rejaiced that the summons had come for his spirit to leave the body and enter the spirit world, where he could praise God. His mind remained perfect to the last moment,

Capt, Link was twice married and by his first wife has left an interesting family of children. He had no children by his hast wife who died several years before him.

The writer believes the community in which Captain Link lived will secept this poor notice as a deserved tribute to the memory of a worthy intelligent honest man, OLD FRIEND.
