OBITUARY.

Captain Silas M. Link departed this life on the night of the 24th of Jan., at the residence of his son in law Dr. W. R. Hughes, in Durham at the advanced age of 73 years.

The memory of a man of the life and character of Silas M. Link, deserves more than this simple notice, on the part of the immediate community in which he lived—it is due to his family and descendants and is of value to the community.

He took a deep interest in politics always acted with the conservative party, but reserved the right to himself of entertaining his own independent opinions.

No man more admired for his bearing, commanding talents, and eloquence in political leaders, and he gloried in the fame of Orange County in having had an unbroken line of such public men in all his days, passing down in uninterrupted succession from the days of James Mebane, Duncan Cameron and Archibald D. Murphy to the present time.

He distinctly foresaw and foretold the inevitable rupture of our political system and prudently provided against one of its evils by parting with his slaves years ago, which he did in a humane manner.

Mr. Link maintained a high moral character, without stain or reproach through life. He was just and upright in all his dealings, and faithfully and well acted his part in all the relations of life, as citizen, neighbor, husband, parent and master.

Early in life he was elected county surveyor, and eminently qualified himself for the discharge of its duties, and deservedly rose to high distinction in that line. He retained the office until a few years since, when he voluntarily gave it up.

He was also examined in court as a witness in land suits and in giving his testimony exhibited in a remarkable manner his conscientious and scrupulous regard for the exact truth and his detestation of falsehood or perjury.

From his life and conversation Captain Link, might at all times have been taken for a Christian and in his last illness declared that for forty years he had tried to serve God, but felt too unworthy to declare his name or enter his church.

Capt. Link was twice married and by his first wife has left an interesting family of children. He had no children by his last wife who died several years before him. The writer believes the community in which Captain Link lived will accept this poor notice as a deserved tribute to the memory of a worthy intelligent honest man.
