We went over to Roxboro last week, spending, I suppose, only one day at the Court House, in the morning. The business rural Roxboro, and some of its ways, and touching the business has reached it. Hotel charges would do credit to the city of Richmond. But then we must remember that Court comes but twice a year and Roxboro has no other hotel any other time. And so we see a complaint of the charges and are surprised that of them by the extraordinary scarcity of money in Person County which gave hotel bills unusual significance. Tobacco is the money crop of the county, and the present time proves that the complaints during the growing season were no idle cry of "woof." There was an actual deficiency of at least three fourths of the crop. Out of the proceeds of the remaining fourth fertilizer had to be paid for—fertilizer everybody uses fertilizer—taxes had to be paid, families sustained, and all the other expenses incidental to social existence provided for. The consequence is that there is an absolute money famine in the county, a starvation complete, that the people are in a measure compelled to dispense with the luxury of newspapers among their other fearful obligations.
But the spirit is abroad to make up in this year for the losses of the last. Never has there been greater activity in preparation for the crop.
A great deal of "new ground" has been cleared; new tobacco barns are going up everywhere. And the planter works with a hopefulness that did not strike him last season. He has a superabundance of plants. The fly exists but has done no harm and threatens none. There will be plants enough in Person to supply the whole tobacco region. And this we find to be the case in Caswell, Rockingham, Granville and in our own county as well. The prospect, therefore, is that the crop will be the largest ever planted. The only fears that the business will be overdone, and that an over supply will bring down prices,—to say nothing of the neglect of other crops. But there is a good breadth of wheat and oats on the ground, though looking only tolerably and we expect the usual amount of corn will be planted.
We saw little of Court proceedings, having an special concern with them and being deterred, and our interest been ever so active, by the dense crowd that packed the Court House. The mass of humanity, black and white, that filled the courtroom, could scarcely have been more closely wedged under hydraulic pressure, and the odor from that scorching, steaming crowd—when we chose the pure breath of the open air. Judge Kerr at the last term of the Court issued an order for the enlargement of the Court room. The Commissioners begged off, owing to a deficit of nine thousand dollars already pressing upon the county, and the really impoverished condition of the people, and so the order has not been enforced. But it is to be hoped that not an hour will be lost after the return of a brighter day to put Person County on equal footing with her sisters.
There was little on the criminal docket beyond affairs, larcenies, stealing without license &c. Elsewhere we may give the sentences of convicted parties. Judge Cox presides with dignity, patience and impartiality, and seems to give most thorough satisfaction to the people. To the recess of the Court his room, at the house of Sheriff Hunt, dec'd, was crowded with those calling to pay their respects to this honored representative of a reformed judiciary.
The bar was rather more slenderly represented than usual. From Orange were Messrs John W. and A. W. Graham and Solicitor Strudwick; from Caswell, Messrs G. N. Thompson and J. A. Leung; and from Person furnished Messrs M. McCheser, identified at home as he is honored abroad; H. T. Jordan, the former distinguished member from the county in the House and Mr. Buquias and Mr. Lunsford. The distinguished Senator Cunningham was also there, taking more pride in his reputation as a farmer than in his senatorial honors, and as proud of his "Cunningham yams" as if they were an invention of his own. But he says he has a right to be proud of them, and has boasted them into very great repute within his hearing.
Court adjourned sine die Wednesday evening. Russell Barnett die, was sent to the Penitentiary for three years, convicted of breaking into the Post Office, and this was the only contribution the Court made to the public works.
Death of Mr. Marcus Harris.
We regret to learn, through Mr. A. J. Roberts of Mangum's Store, that Mr. Marcus Harris of that vicinity died last week of disease of the heart. He was one of the most prominent citizens of Flat River, a good and useful man. He was sixty six years of age.

In answer to the first, the officer, if honestly administered, will confer to the benefit of two or three appointees from this section, and that will be all. And in regard to the second, surely the members of Democrats cannot be so short as to have forgotten already the use of government money by the act of the government itself to influence public opinion and control elections.
Let the Republicans do their own begging, and their own begging in the scramble for office. To them being at the spoils, and it ought to be a matter of indifference to us who gets them. Democrats ought to keep clear of commitments which may at a future time find them very disagreeably recorded.
