THE UNCERTAIN FUTURE OF COTTON.

So far as the amount of cotton in sight and likely to come forward is concerned, however, we think there has been a pretty general tendency to admit that, so far as deductions can be drawn from figures already shown, there will be enough to dissipate the idea of a short crop, and the most sanguine adhere to the belief of an excess over last year, and the turn of speculation, therefore, is more upon the probabilies regarding the disposition of the product. This as a matter of course, is dependent, to a large extent, upon the condition of affairs in Kurope, and in the influence of foreign advices is of a more general and pronounce ed character than a couple of weeks ago The developments of the past week have in many respects changed the attitude of the leading governments towards each other, and especially those which are in the ordinary course of events the most liberal con-sumers of cotton, and the issue of war or peace becomes a pivot upon which operations will no doubt turn until the existing politiale muddle commences to clear up somewhat. Opinions among the trade upon the subject are as numerous and contradictory as the dispatches daily coming to hand by cable, but none strong enough to lead to free operations, and few new deals have been made on contracts based upon either a quiet settlement of existing difficulties or a re-opening of hostilities in a new and more serious form. Should peace prevail, an upward turn of values is of course to be expected, but a great many of our leading dealers still adhere to the belief that the improvement will only be temporary, especially should the flurry carry a large advance, on the theory that the consuming countries are unable to handle any but cheap cotton, and then only on the hand to mouth method, -New York Bul letin.

PERCENTAGE OF CREAM AND BUTTER.

from a given quantity of milk, an exchange says there is "no necessary relationship between the percentage of cream and the butter production of the milk, and experiments have proved that of two milks, one with the smallest quantity of cream, as indicated by the percentage glass, yielded the most but. ter. Indeed, the per cent, of cream indicated by the narrow cream guage is a fallacious guids. There is only one way at present known to test the butter quality of milk, and this is the making of butter from a known quantity of milk. It may be satisfactory to claim forty percent of crean-from milk, but is it useful? The quantity of cream a milk will yield is of importance to the seller of cream. It does not indicatthe butter yield of a cow. Per cent, of cream and per cent, of butter are two entirely different matters when used to ex press the richness of a cow's milk. A quart of milk which throws up four per cent. of creum, may make more butter than a quart of milk which throws up ten cent, of cream. It is probable that the percentage glass may give indication of the quality of the butter from a cow, and tel something of the churning quality of the butter richness of the milk."

REMEDIES FOR INSECTS.

The greenish-black jumping beetle. tenth of an in.h long. feeding on both cab-bages and turnips while young, is kept in check by dusting whith sulphur and plaster. or by applying slightly a solution of whal-oil, soap or tobacco water. Sowing thickly and repeatedly may secure a crop, or by selecting different localities. The insecwhich causes the club foot in cabbage may be repelled by lime and wood asher, but a change to fresh land is better. Wireworms and grab-worms may be killed by the slow process of digging around the in-jured plant for them; but the best way ito give clean land, well cultivated and en riched, with frequent waterings to stimulate growth, which will tend to insure against these underground enemies. The green worms are best cleared from cabbuges by hand picking. Plant-lice are driven off by whale oil, soap, sulphur, plaster, tobacco-water, etc; if applied early so as not to in-jure the taste of the cabbages. As a rule for guarding against insects generally, male the ground rien, keep it clean and mellow. cutivate often and water freely,

Take equal parts of pulverized alum and salt, and sprinkle over the skin while it is green (or if dry, wet it with water) until it will soak up no more, and then roll it into a tight roll and lay away for about therty-six fours. It will gather meisture suffici-ent to form a brine which will cure the skin. Then unroll and spread to dry; when nearly dry, work it and stretch it until it is entirely dry, when it will be soft and pliable. and wear as well as if tanned by some pa-tent process. This is a simple and easy plan and easily tried. I used to tan wood-chuck skins in this way, and have them made into mittens,

SUCCESS in sheep husbandry depends largely upon the manager of the flock. Good shepherds are rare. There is no use of thinking of going into the business and of making it a success without any previous experience. If one cannot begin in a small way, with a few good, healthy young sheep and grow into the basiness gradually, he had better not undertake it. Purchase no old sheep, no matter how low the price may be. Be sure there is no disease a-mong them. Sheep are animals which can be made especially profitable on lands of medium of poor quality. As a rule the most profitable way of managing a flock will be the best way. The kind of sheep to raise will depend upon the locality. Near large cities it will be found to be the most advantageous to raise such sheep only that are capable of being fattened with rare perfection, and at the same time yield a fleece of long and glossy wood, which can be manufactured into a variety of useful and elegant fabrics.

The practice of feeding wet, raw corn meal is very injurious to all kinds of fowls. and especially to turkeys. Small grain and corn bread, meal just mixed with water and baked, then dampened, may be ted, and the chicks will thrive. A pan of sour wilk set out to them will disappear in an incredibly short time, and the cord scalded and the whey poured off is excellent for
