GRAHAM HIGH SCHOOL

ng the pleasantest incidents of our attendance on the late Alamance Superior Court was a visit to the Graham High School now under the charge of the Rev. D. A. Long. We took special pleasure in this visit, because this school is one of the very few of high character in the State, and because its rise from obscurity is one of the most instructive lessons of individual sacrifices and ultimate reward that we have ever known presented for the example of youth.

The institute was originally incorpora-

ted as the Graham College by the Chris-tian Church, the date of incorporation being about the year 1857.

It subsequently fell under difficulty, and in 1872, came into the bands of the present proprietor, the corporate name being also changed to conform to the present title. It is now in successful existence as a not sectarian school, being pat. routed liberally by all denominations,

As will be seen by the advertisement in another column, to which we refer incldentally, the faculty consists of the Rev. D. A. Long, A. M the Rev. W. W. Staley. A. M. the Rev. W. S. Long, A. M. and Miss, Jennie Albright. The honorary titles of the gentlemen are not simply ornamental, but corned by hard work at the Universities of North Carolina and Virginia, at which latter, the Rev. Mr. Staley has recently finished a supplementary course. About six of the pupils of the school are now at the University of North Carolina and their high stand denotes the thoroughness of their preparation-About the same number will join at the pext commencement.

The success of Mr Long is a lesson to youth, eager for fame or for wealth, but too apt to be appailed by difficulties of attainment. He is one of seven brothers, the sons of a highly respected, but very poor man, and whatever of liberal education these young men might hope to possess was made absolutely dependent upon their own efforts. Manfully at d success fully they all went forward to the contest. Of the seven, three are in the ministry, after being thoroughly educated, one is a physician in respectable practice, one is a lawyer of rising fame, one cultivates the paternal acres, and the seventh laid down his life in the cause of the South in one of the bloory buttle fields of the late civil
