We fell into an error in regard to the locality of the death of the lamented John Henry Curtis; doing so in reliance upon memory of the statement of the fact soon after its occurrence. He was killed, not on the retreat, but in line of battle, on the third day of the Bentonville fight, falling by the ball of a sharp shooter at his post by one of the guns of his battery, and near the side of his Captain, H. P. Jones. The battery was not actually engaged in fighting at the moment, the command being busy in strengthening their breastworks. Mr. Curtis had just been relieved from his work and was standing erect, with his arms outstretched, when the fatal bullet found its mark. He lived until 12 o'clock that night.

ORANGE SUPERIOR COURT.

FALL TERM—FIRST WEEK.

Judge McKay promptly took his seat on the bench at 10 o'clock on Monday the 15th instant, and went at once to work. The Grand Jury was drawn and sworn, Dr. Price Jones being made foreman, and Judge McKay proceeded to charge them as to their duties.

We have heard many charges to the Grand Jury—never a better, rarely as good a one, and only wish it were possible to give an intelligible synopsis of it; but it occupied more than an hour in its delivery, and to abbreviate it to our space would present it short of its beauty and force. It must suffice to say that the duties, obligations, rights and powers of the Grand body of Inquest of the county were presented with an impressiveness and a solemnity that would make evasion a crime; because there was not a single phase of the questions for the consideration of that body which was not critically examined and loudly presented; nor was there an offence against the law which was not recalled with vivid distinctness in all its ruinous operations against the well-being of society. Certain crimes, his Honor especially dwelt upon with great emphasis, as prevalent in fearful frequency; among which was that of perjury, made more possible now by the change in the law of evidence permitting parties to testify in their own behalf.

It was a charge altogether full of wisdom, justice, and benevolence, eloquently enforced, and one fitted to inspire the people with a spirit of reverence for the law and obedience to its commands; a charge as instructive to the people as it was to the Jury, and we only regret that a certain indistinctness of voice prevented a perfect apprehension of all that was said.

Judge McKay at this term has added new titles to his already lofty character for learning, purity, impartiality, courtesy, promptness, and willful vigor and stern enforcement of the law; tender, yet firm, patient, yet inflexible, courteous yet determined. He has, as much as any Judge we have ever known, the respect of the bar and the love of the people,—a true North Carolina judge of the olden regime.

This term of the Court was expected to be an interesting one from the fact of the existence of two capital cases upon the docket. But that of Bob. Basler indicted for the murder of Nancy Blackwell and her two children, was continued on account of the unavoidable absence of a woman, an important witness for the State, who was not in a condition to appear; and that of Henry Hopson, charged with the murder of Fowler Davis in complicity with her husband was continued on affidavit on the part of the defense.

The week was taken up with the State docket, which was filled with larcenies, affrays, assaults and batteries &c., some of the latter of which were of an aggravated character.

We name only such cases in which convictions were had:

Dani. Hall, col. larceny, penitentiary 3 years; Nash Trellinger, col. do. 3 years; Oscar Johnson col. do. 3 years; Nancy Kilgroe, col. do. 1 year county jail, or labor under orders of County Commissioners, Susan Howard, col. do.

Henry Davis, col. A. & B. 12 months county jail, or labor; Henry Davis col. A. & B. 6 months do. do.

The State vs. Jesse Wright, William Paine Jr, Wiley Day and Bedford Wilson, all colored, indicted for assault and battery committed upon a colored girl, one Lou Pin, excited much interest from the idea of the aggravated and atrocious character of the assault which possessed the public mind. The evidence on the part of the State, was not as forcible in presenting the gravity of the offence as might have been wished, the main witness relied upon as a spectator of one portion of the transaction, Ruffin Green, on the afternoon of the first day of the trial lying without stain; the next morning, he appeared again before the Court asking leave to correct his first statement, admitting that he had lied without reserve under the effect of threats of personal violence made by the defendants. The Jury were convinced of the truth of his latter statements; and, connected with other testimony, justified a verdict of guilty against all the defendants.

Another of the defendants, Charles Long, was taken at Durham, and was put on trial on Monday, and in the mean time the other defendants were lodged in the jail to await the sentence of the Court.

The case of the State against John W. Copeland, William H. Copeland, Sam'l A. Copeland and James L. Smith for assault on the highway upon Thomas Ruffin Sikes excited much interest from the character of the parties, and the large and influential connections on the side of both the prosecutor and defendants. Messrs John W. Graham and Thomas Ruffin appeared for the State and C. E. Parsh and S. H. Webb for the defence. A verdict of guilty was rendered, and they were discharged from further penalty beyond the payment of costs.

We bring the proceedings of the Court up to Saturday afternoon.

The Wilmington Herald narrates an accident from kerosene, a daughter of Col. Roger Moore having knocked over a gas lamp, causing the lamp to explode, and severely, though not fatally burning herself and her father.

ENTER.

Easter morn dawned with a brightness and a gladness as if nature had put herself in joyous sympathy with the grand event of which the day was the commemoration. At sunrise the inspiring psalm of the new bell rang out from the belfry of St. Matthew's, and filled many hearts with emotion, that they were once more summoned to the sanctuary by the solemn voice of a call in this case especially consecrated by sacred and tender associations.

There was a large concourse in attendance upon St. Matthew's at the service at 11 o'clock. The Church was more tastefully and beautifully decorated than we ever remember to have seen it, rich in flowers and floral designs. The high altar was enriched by two memorial offerings; one, a beautiful, highly finished metallic cross in memorial dear little Mattie Gwinn, the beloved of the whole congregation, and two highly finished metallic vases, in memorial Miss Alice Ruffin.

To these, as well as to the memorial bell, the Rector made feeling and eloquent allusion in his sermon in a voice well nigh choked with emotion.

The services of the Church were altogether of a beautiful and striking character. The music, of which there was a good deal, was pronounced very good, the sermon was impressive and excellent, and there seemed to be a more general sentiment of genuine christian appreciation of the occasion than is usual.

We will add in connection with the bell, that there is some disappointment in the volume of its sound. It is a wonderfully fine instrument, but the sound is too confined at present. That fault will be rectified during this week.
