—Full proceedings of the Federal Court in to-morrow.

—Freights are so heavy on the Richmond & Danville and North Carolina Railroads that trains transiting are run in sections: for instance the regular freight train leaving Greensboro, moving East on Sunday evening was divided into three sections of about twenty cars each. These trains run on schedule time, and within about fifteen minutes of each other. Every precaution is taken so as to avoid accidents.

Federal Court.

The federal court for the Western district of North Carolina convened in this city this morning. Hon R P Dick, Judge, presiding. His Honor was very brief in his charge to the Grand Jury. It was, however, concise and to the point. He touched upon the postal laws and called special attention to the Revenue laws as being the prime object of attention.

Dr. Craven's Lecture.

The lecture of Dr. Craven, before the Young Men's Christian Association last evening at the Methodist church in this city was largely attended, and the lecture was all that could have been expected from the distinguished divine. His subject, "The Machinery of Morals," was handled in a masterly manner. From the beginning to the close Dr. Craven kept the audience deeply interested in his subject. We expected to publish full notes of the lecture, but we have been disappointed in not receiving the report, which we supposed would be furnished in time for to-day's paper.

Funeral of Mrs Eckel.

The funeral services of Mrs Mary E Eckel took place from the residence of the deceased at 11 o'clock this morning. The Rev D R Bruton, pastor of the M E Church in this city, assisted by the Rev Dr Bobbitt, conducted the exercises. Mr Bruton delivered a very beautiful and appropriate address; giving a brief sketch of the life of Mrs Eckel. This was followed with prayer by Rev Dr Bobbitt. From the residence the remains were taken to the Methodist Cemetery where the last sad rights attending the burial of the dead were performed. A large number of relatives and friends were present. The following gentlemen acted as pall bearers: Messrs Charles G Yates, James T Morehead, N Gretter, W D McAdoo, B E Sergeant, J W Scott, James W Albright and G W Alley.

The Clyde Syndicate.

GREENVILLE S. C., April 3.—It is stated here, upon what is deemed to be unquestioned authority, that the Clyde syndicate controlling the Richmond and Danville and other roads from Richmond, Va. to Atlanta, Ga., have secured control of the Spartanburg and Union Railway, an important road running from Spartanburg to Union, in this State. The parties are endeavoring to keep the matter from the public until to-morrow, when they expect to become the purchasers of the Spartanburg and Asheville Road, running from Spartanburg, S. C. to Asheville, a thriving town in the extreme western part of North Carolina, immediately on the line of the Western North Carolina Road, another branch operated by that syndicate, which is being pushed through to Tennessee. The statement that the first road has passed into the control of the Richmond and Danville and that the latter will be purchased by them to-morrow excites considerable interest in this State.

Telegraphic News Notes.

Yesterday Lord Beaconsfield was thought to be improving.—Jules Kool, the painter of Paris, is dead.—The dead lock in the United States Senate continues; yesterday's session was engaged in showing up Kildebever, the Republican candidate for Sergeant-at-Arms.
