The Clyde Syndicate. [Philadelphia Times.]

GREENVILLE S C., April 3 -It is stated h-re, upon what is deemed to be unquestioned anthority, that the Clyde syndieare controlling the Richmond and Danville and other roads from Richmond, Va. to Atlanta, Ga, have secured control of the Spartausburg and Union Railway, an important road running from Spartansburg to Union, in this State. The parties are endeavoring to keep the matter from the public until to morrow, when they expect to become the purchasers of the Spartans burg and Asheville Road, running from Spatansburg, 8. C , to Asheville, a thriving town in the extreme western part of North Carolina, immediately on the line of the Western North Carolina Road, another branch operated by that syndicate, which s being pushed through to Tennessee. The statement that the first road has passed into the control of the Richmond and Danville and that the latter will be purchased by them to-morrow excites considerable interest in this State.
