## Home Happenings.

—Wood is scarce and in demand

—Went our city authorities give us a well at some point between Benbow Hall and the Railroad depot?

—Our city market has not been well supplied with meats &c during the past two weeks. Good beef is very scarce, and high. Poultry is high—and in demand, and so it is with almost every class of family supplies.

—The Benbow House, in this city, will be opened on August 1st, '81. This is one of the finest hotel buildings in the State, but for a term of years it has been closed by lease to another party, and that lease expires during the month of July.

—The widow of the late Michael O'Donnell, the engineer who was killed on the North Carolina Railroad near Lexington early in January last, will receive \$2,000 to-morrow morning from the Knights of Honor, of which order he was a member. Capt Lee M. Hawkins received the money from the National Bank of Greensboro to-day, and will forward the amount to Mrs O'Donnell by Capt E C Bowman, of the Richmond & Danville Railroad Co., this evening.

### Federal Court.

Since we went to press yesterday the following cases have been disposed of in the United States Court now in session in this city. United States vs. Eli Bean for illicit distilling. Jury trial verdict guilty.

United States vs. Jack Thomson, charge, passing counterfeit U. S. coin. Jury trial, verdict guilty. Judgement of the court \$100 fine and costs and 3 years imprisonment in the Penitentiary at Albany, New York.

To-day has been consumed in the trial of

the case of the United States vs. John M. Kimb and Henderson Brewer charged with breaking into the Post Office at Brewer's Mill in Randolph county. The defense was conducted by Messrs. Keogh & Barringer. District-Attorney Boyd prosecuting; at 1:30 o'clock the jury returned a verdict of guilty as to both defendants.

### Religious Intelligence.

Rev. J. B. Ford, D. D., of Tennessee will preach in the Methodist church of this city next Sunday at 11 o'clock, a. m.

Rev. Dr. W. H. Bobbitt, the Presiding Elder has changed the time for holding the Greensboro District Conference of the M. E. Church from the 1st Sunday in August to the 5th Sunday in July, beginning on the Thursday morning before, and Rev. W. S. Black, the Presiding Elder, changes the time of the Salisbury District Conference from the 1st to the 2nd Sunday in August. These changes are made to prevent conflict with the Prohibitory election, which occurs the first Thursday in August.
