Strange About Alcoholic Drinks and

Health.

Inasmuch as there seems to be

considerable difficulty in the statute

which requires the listing of alcohol

drinks and narcotics and

the effects upon the human sys-

tem, I make the fol-

lowing statement:

1. The State Board of Education

can supply with this law and give

full effect to it by putting upon the

list in text books two small books.

2. The smallest of these books

will cost about twenty cents and is

not to be purchased and used by

the children, but is intended for

the teachers, as a guide to the oral

instruction to be given to the chil-

dren in the primary grades—all

children who have not advanced to

the fourth reader. In the city

schools may be found best and

practicable to have this book also

put in the hands of the children.

3. The other book is to be in the

hands of the pupils in the fourth

and higher grades—those who can

read in the fourth and higher read-

ers—and is to be used until com-

pleted, as most other textbooks.

Many "Jingles" will be used before

they advance fast enough to use

this book. It will cost probably

not more than thirty cents and is

the only book that will have to be

supplied by any needs except

those who remain in school and

study the higher branches of the

higher course. For classes in such

higher branches we have had on

the list for some years "Scribner's

Higginson's Physiology Alphabetic,"

the cost of fifty cents. This book

can be used with the exception of the

first, of course we shall never

4. The books selected will con-

tain not only matter on the sub-

narcotics, but also valuable

information as to the preservation
