> FLOGGED AT THE PEN. Story of Federal Prisoners In-

> > carcerated.

Washington, May 9.—The Evening Star yesterday published a complaint from a number of Federal prisoners incarcerated in the State penitentiary at Raleigh, N. C. The prisoners were ordered to work at some brick yards 8 miles from the prison and refused to comply, claiming immunity under the law from labor outside of the prison walls, whereupon they were flogged for insubordination.

The complaint was submitted to the Attorney General and an investigation has been ordered.

A conference of the Mormon Church is in session at Chattanooga, Tenn. There are over 500 elders and 9,000 communicants in the Southern states.

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
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
