The county commissioners were in session most of the day Monday, transacting a considerable amount of business. Among the routine business receiving their attention was the issuing

of a number of "outside poer" orders. A committee appeared before the beard and asked that the United States government be allowed the continued free use of the county court house for Federal court purposes. The commissioners have never had any intention of making any charge for the use of the court house, the only stipulation being that the government furnish fuel and pay for lights and janitor's services during the sessions of the Federal court, The government authorities will hardly object to such an arrangement, and this will probably end the talk of moving the Federal court from Greensboro.

A Sunday Wreck.

A bad wreck eccurred on the yard of the Southern Railway at this place about 6 o'clock Sunday morning, resulting in the loss of one life and the destruction of a considerable amount of property. Train No. 33, known as the "Florida special," due to arrive here at 5.20 a. m., was late on this occasion and as it came around the curve near Sergeant's foundry ran into a through freight which was standing board of county commissioners, was on the track. The caboose and two box cars were demolished and the engine and tender of the oncoming passenger train badly damaged. Beyond a few slight bruises the engineer of No. 33, Dave Beaver, was not injured. His negro fireman, Phil. Hanna, of Richmend, attempted to save himself by jumping, but was caught between the engine and tender. His legs were crushed in a horrible manner and it was more than an hour before he could be released. One of his legs was amputated in the afternoon and he died soon after. With the exception of a fireman by the name of Caldwell, who was in the caboose car of the through freight, no one else was hurt. Caldwell was not seriously injured, though it is a miracle that he escaped alive, for the caboose was literally torn into kindling wood.

All is Ready for the New Jail.

The magistrates of Guilford county met in the court house Monday and officially sanctioned the transfers of public property involved in the preliminaries incident to the building of the new jail, and with which our readers are familiar.

Mr. J. S. Cox,of Greensboro, was made chairman of the meeting and Mr. R. S. Williams, of Oak Ridge, secretary. Mr. J. N. Wilson and a Patriot representative assisted the secretary.

It is almost equal in size to the present hitching lot and could be utilized for a like purpose, as the

Several magistrates favored the purchase of the church property, no one offering an objection, and the discussion ended with the unanimous adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved. That the justices of the peace of Guilford county recommend to the board of commissioners of the county that if they can secure the lot at the corner of Gaston and Greene streets belonging to the Episcopal Church for \$1,000, that they purchase

Mr. Boren asked the magistrates to co-operate with the other county authorities in suppressing the smallpox which had appeared at the terra cotta works, urging them to impress the people of their communities with the importance of observing reasonable precautions against the spread of the disease. He said that only two new cases had recently developed and it was thought the disease could be readily stamped out. No deaths have resulted from it up to this time.
