# Death of Former Convict.

News has been received here of the death, at his home in Springfield, Ill., of George A. Summers, who was recently pardoned from the convict road force of this county. Dropey was the cause of his death. Summers was formerly manager of the Greensboro in this paper, the "Clean Sweep Sale." office of the Singer Sewing Machine Company and about four years ago was charged with embezzling the sum of \$1,400 from the company. While under bond he left the state and later was captured at his home in Illinois. He was brought back to Greensboro, and after being tried and convicted, was sentenced to the roads for five years. Governer Glenn pardonded him abou four months ago on account of failing health.
