Murphy Defeats Kennett for Legislature—Kirkman Wins Over Rankin—County Convention Will Nominate Treasurer.

The Democratic precinct primaries Saturday resulted in the nomination of the following candidates: Col. John A. Barringer, for the state senate; Dr. J. R. Gordon and T. J. Murphy, house of representatives; B. E. Jones, sheriff; A. G. Kirkman, register of deeds; W. W. Wood, coroner; Robert Gilchrist, surveyor; Dr. W. G. Bradshaw, John A. Young, L. A. Walker, J. A. Davidson and W. C. Tucker, county commissioners.

Neither of the candidates for county treasurer received a majority of the votes cast in the primaries, thereby leaving the nomination to the county convention to be held Saturday.

On account of the unfavorable weather and the absence of any spirited contest, a light vote was polled. County Chairman Brown has received the returns from all the precincts except South Madison and Greene, showing the total number of votes received by each candidate to be as follows:

County Convention Saturday.

The county convention will be called to order in the Grand opera house, in this city, Saturday at 11 o'clock. Aside from confirming the nominations made by the precinct primaries, the convention will nominate a candidate for county treasurer, Mr. Weatherly having received a sufficient number of votes to prevent either Mr. McNairy or Mr. McKinney from receiving the nomination in the primaries.

Every loyal Guilford county Democrat who may attend the convention will have a voice in the proceedings, and it is expected that the convention will be one of the largest held in this county in several years.

A special attraction will be the presence of ex-Governor Aycock, who will make a speech of interest and inspiration to all Democrats. As a public speaker Mr. Aycock has no superior in North Carolina. He does not come to Guilford as a candidate for any office or in behalf of any candidate, but to make a Democratic speech to Democrats. It has not been decided whether he will speak before or after the business of the convention shall have been transacted.

COMMISSIONERS IN SESSION.

Circus Not to Interfere With Fair and Centennial—Road Matters Considered—Preachers Not to Pay Poll Tax.

The September meeting of the county commissioners was held Monday and yesterday, all the members of the board being present except Chairman Davidson, who was detained at home by illness. In the absence of the chairman, Commissioner Tucker presided over the meeting.

A committee from the Central Carolina Fair Association appeared before the board and asked that a prohibitive tax be placed upon the sale of toy whips during the approaching fair. In the past the sale of these whips has proven a great nuisance, and the authorities desire to prevent it this year. The board placed a tax of \$250 on any one offering whips for sale within a radius of a half mile from the fair grounds.

J. W. King, a Confederate veteran who recently came to Greensboro from Cumberland county, was exempted from the payment of a peddler's tax.

On account of his physical condition, J. K. Osborne was exempted from road duty.

A committee from the Chamber of Commerce asked that the county make an appropriation of \$500 a year to aid in the work of the organization. The board deferred final action on the matter.

Citizens of the community asked that the board arrange for better drainage facilities on Horsepen creek, in the vicinity of Guilford College. It was decided to have the district surveyed and an estimate made of the cost of the necessary work, the surveyor to submit a report at the next meeting of the board.

Committees from the Chamber of Commerce, the Greensboro Retail Merchants' Association and the Tobacco Board of Trade joined a number of citizens of the community in a request that the public road leading from Summerfield to the Rockingham county line be macadamized. The board spent considerable time in hearing the matter, but took no action.

A petition for a change of the public road leading from Climax to Julian was granted.

An appropriation of \$10 was made for the road leading from J. J. Busick's to the county line.

Superintendent Tyson was instructed to work the public roads running through Guilford Battle Ground with the convict force for a period of time not to exceed two days.

A committee representing the Central Carolina Fair Association and the board of managers of the centennial requested the board to take action to prevent any circus from exhibiting in the county during the fair and centennial week. The board adopted a resolution to the effect that no circus be permitted to give any performance in the county between October 1st and 20th.

The board adopted a resolution exempting from the payment of poll tax all ministers of the gospel engaged in the active work of the ministry in Guilford county.

The usual appropriation of \$50 was made to the North Carolina Children's Home Society.

THE SOLDIERS ARE COMING.

War and Navy Departments to Aid in Centennial Celebration.
The military feature of the centennial is expected to add greatly to the success of Greensboro's gala week in October. In addition to the cavalry and infantry to be supplied by the government, the Gate City Guards and several other companies of the National Guards will be here and participate in parades and sham battles.

Mr. G. S. Bradshaw, president of the centennial board of managers, is in receipt of a letter stating that the secretary of war has issued orders commanding a troop of the Twelfth cavalry and a company of the Seventeenth infantry to report in Greensboro for the week.

The company of infantry will be accompanied by the full regimental band.

Through the efforts of Senator Overman, who, by the way, is manifesting a deep interest in the centennial and doing everything in his power to aid the management, the Navy department has granted a request for the loan of a big portable searchlight. The searchlight will be a great attraction.

Rag-Tags Will be There.

Editor Patriot—A worker for Mr. J. W. McNairy for county treasurer said today that nobody but the rag-tags and bob-tails voted for Weatherly or McKinney in the primary. Maybe, but these same rag-tags and bob-tails, by which is meant the men of no influence or standing, will be on hand at the convention next Saturday and will remember what has been said.
