CHILDREN'S WEEK IS BEING OBSERVED IN IMPRESSIVE MANNER

One of the most interesting features of "Children's Week" exercises here this week was the baby contest conducted at the Y. W. C. A. hut on Monday. About 200 Greensboro babies passed in review before a dozen doctors and a large number of parents and other interested spectators.

In the infant class, which includes children up to nine months of age, first prize was awarded to Frank R. Hutton, Jr., six-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank R. Hutton, Jr., 607 South Mendenhall street. The prize is a new dress donated by the Jack and Jill shop.

First honors in the second group, composed of children between the ages of nine months and two years, were attained by Charles E. Bennett, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Bennett, 200 Scott avenue. A five-dollar gold piece was the prize, presented by the Metropolitan Life Insurance company.

Miss Margaret Goodman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Goodman, 1110 North Elm street, won first prize in the third group, composed of children from two to four years old. It was five dollars in gold, given by Mrs. Caesar Cone. First prize in the fourth group, four to six years of age, was awarded to Sarah Goodman, Margaret's sister. The prize, a five-dollar gold piece, was given by Mrs. Julius Cone. The physical condition of the prize winners was pronounced virtually perfect.

On Tuesday almost 4,000 children took part in interesting games staged at the county court house grounds under the supervision of H. W. Park, physical director of the city schools, assisted by Miss Mary Coleman, physical director of the North Carolina College for Women, and Miss Morlock, supervisor of music in the city schools. The exercises of the day were under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher Association. Mrs. E. S. Wills having been active in direction of the program.

At 10 o'clock the day's program began with the playing of games by children under school age. Subsequently and successively recreational activity was engaged in by children from the first, second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades. Later representatives of the Y. M. C. A. played baseball and volleyball.

From 3 to 3.30 a splendid recreational program was presented by students of the high school. Interesting exhibitions were given by the Boy Scouts from 3.35 to 3.50. A notable feature of the afternoon was an exhibition by the drum and bugle corps of the Boy Scouts under the direction of Frank Hood and Chief Bugler Tutt. Community singing was enjoyed during the late afternoon.

Yesterday was observed as book day of children's week. The program was featured by book showers for all the city schools. Today is music day. The schools opened with concerts of children's music. This afternoon a concert was given in the Smith Memorial building by Miss Lora Lulsdorf. At 8 o'clock this evening Miss Lulsdorf, assisted by Miss Viola Tucker, will give a concert at the O. Henry hotel.

Tomorrow will be health day and a noteworthy feature will be the appearance of "Cho Cho" a famous health clown. He will entertain the white children of the city from the first four grades at the Grand theater beginning at 9.30 o'clock. The "Cho Cho" program for the negro children of the elementary grades will begin at the Grand at 11 tomorrow morning.

Saturday will be observed as exhibit day. Visitors will be welcomed at the Woman's club building on North Edgeworth street from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. Many interesting exhibits are planned. The following day will be community Sunday. At 3.30 p. m. Sunday Dr. Estelle Hunter of Chicago, will deliver an address at the Grand theater on child welfare.

The program for the week is being carried out under the direction of the Federated clubs of Greensboro.
