

SAD DEATH.—Charles W. Horner, a ... but more recently a school teacher, came to town Saturday on business and during the day partook rather freely of whisky. He remained until late in the afternoon when he left for his mother's a distance of eight miles. In the outskirts of town he called at the residence of a gentleman a little after dark and complained of being very cold. He remained a short time and left saying he expected to stop with a friend about three miles distant. On leaving he did not appear to be very much intoxicated. Nothing more was heard of him until Sunday afternoon his lifeless body was found in an old field near the road two and half miles from Durham. His remains were conveyed to Durham and deposited in the Mayor's office. Dr. J. Wilson, the coroner, was telegraphed to and reached Durham about Monday. A jury was immediately summoned and an inquest held. It was determined that his death was due to cold while intoxicated. His remains were conveyed to a very nice coffin. His mother, who was recently dressed and buried by several friends left for home.

—Dr. R. K. Gregory, of Greensboro, who has recently established a branch office in Durham, has been appointed pension surgeon for North Carolina with a salary of \$2,500 a year. —Up on Buck Water the people are so intent upon growing rich that they forget when Sunday comes. A few Sundays since a young farmer arose early in order to do a good day's plowing and his wife was busy about her domestic duties. The young man had been plowing for an hour or two when a friend came by on his way to church and asked what he meant. The situation was explained and the farmer hastened to leave the field and properly observe the Sabbath.

—On last Wednesday Joseph Gentry of Person county, brought suit against B. W. Matthews, town constable, for illegal arrest. The suit was brought before Col. D. C. Parrish, a Justice of the Peace, N. Lunsford, of Person county appearing for Gentry and P. M. Briggs for Matthews. It seems that Gentry was under the influence of whisky and misbehaved on the streets and Matthews arrested him and took him before the Mayor. There is a town ordinance empowering and requiring the police officer of the town to arrest such offenders, whenever and wherever in the corporate limits they are found violating a town ordinance, without a warrant. Gentry through his counsel admitted that he had violated the laws of the town but denied the right of the officer without first being equipped with a warrant to make the arrest. Counsel argued that it was unconstitutional. The Justice decided that the ordinance was constitutional whereupon the plaintive prayed an appeal and it goes up to our next Superior Court.
