

But in the never-ending battle against piled-up leaves, pay careful attention to safety precaustions, warns the Insurance Information Institute:


Burn leaves in a covered container with holes or wire mesh construction. Pick a day with little wind and stay near the fire at all times with a garden hose ready for emergency. Set up your fire at a safe distance from buildings, fences and shrubbery! Keep children far away and keep an eye on flying sparks.

In some areas, leaf burning might be restricted to certain times or completely outlawed. Find out the exact regulations in your town.
