

WCU Catamounts Begin Drills

Western Carolina University's head football coach Bob Waters welcomed ninety-four athletes Monday afternoon as the Catamounts opened pre-season practice.

IRS FORMS BEING ORDERED

Greensboro—Many taxpayers are ordering blank income tax forms from the IRS Service Center in Chamblee, Georgia, instead of from the District Office of the Internal Revenue Service in Greensboro, according to J. E. Wall, Director.

Wall said that although practically all completed forms should be mailed direct to the Service Center in Chamblee, requests for blank forms should be sent to Greensboro to facilitate handling.

The following address should be used in ordering tax forms: Internal Revenue Service, Supply Section, 320 Federal Place, Greensboro, N. C. 27401.

Actual practice sessions began Tuesday morning and will continue daily at 9:30 A.M. and 3:00 P.M. with an occasional night session, until Western's season opener with Murray State, September 11, in Asheville's Memorial Stadium. "We have a very limited amount of pre-season practice time and must get ready much quicker than in the past," said Waters.

Fifty-four veterans and forty freshmen, representing the best recruiting year in WCU history, will make up the Catamount's pre-season camp.

Western carries a five game winning streak into the 1971 season and has had two consecutive winning seasons, 9-1, and 6-3, under Waters, a former NFL quarterback. However, with only fifteen letter winners returning and a torturous schedule for the first half of the season Waters and his staff are working overtime.

Providing a nucleus for '71 Catamounts is a group of talented returning regulars. Defensively, tackles Steve Williams, a 6 ft. 5 inch, 260

pound pro prospect, and quick hitting Mike Cater; ends Les Herrin and Jim Dougherty, also pro material at 6 ft 3 inch, 235 pound; linebacker Stacey Ray and veteran all-district cornerback Jimmy Laughridge have been starters for at least two seasons. The leaders of the offensive unit are outstanding guards Tony Ashley and Jim Davis, tailback Otis McIntosh, WCU's all-time great rusher, fullback Eddy Sveum and quarterback Hal Mote, all regulars last fall.

Coach Waters displays seven sophomores in starting roles and a dozen more in second line positions on his depth chart. Despite the abundance of inexperienced personnel in key positions and apparent lack of depth, Waters, is far from pessimistic. "We are young but this team has a lot of talent and a winning attitude," the Cats mentor offered.

After the Catamounts open with Murray State, they must face Tennessee Tech, Appalachian State, Jacksonville State and Furman before returning home.

Littering More Costly Motorists had better think twice before they litter North Carolina highways after September 1. On that date the fine for littering will increase from \$50 to \$200 under a law enacted by the 1971 General Assembly. Paul J. DuPre, state highway maintenance engineer, said Sunday highway crews are in the process of changing some 5,000 road signs in North Carolina warning against littering. This will cost the state between \$5,000 and \$10,000. "Many of the signs are old and about ready to be replaced anyway," DuPre said in an interview. "On those signs that are still in good condition, decals are being used to cover up the \$50 figure and substitute \$200." DuPre said the state spent about \$3.5 million last fiscal year to clean up litter thrown out by motorists on North Carolina highways. "The public is demanding cleaner highways in this age of ecology," DuPre said, "and some of those who are making the demands are doing the littering." Although interstate highways and some other major roads are cleaned up more often, maintenance crews do their roadside cleaning on a semi-annual basis-spring and fall. DuPre noted that during the clean-up in one highway division, 696 truckloads of litter were picked up. Will the increased fine curb the littering? "I don't think it will have a big effect," he said. "The biggest effect will come from education of the public to the fact that it's costing us millions of dollars to pick up litter that shouldn't have been thrown out. We could spend more money." The Highway Commission has more than 900 litter cans alongside roads throughout the state. These are chained to posts. Plastic bag liners are used in the cans and the litter can be removed easily, DuPre noted. "We've had to move the location of several litter cans," he said, "because people were turning them into household garbage dumps." DuPre added, "we have at least four men and two trucks in each of the 14 highway divisions that make the rounds at least twice a week to empty the litter cans. They also collect the litter at roadside rest areas.
