The Modees and the United States troops have been fighting briskly among the lava beds, Capt. Jack and the Indians being cut off from water. Our troops have decidedly the advantage and we trust, that it will not be a great while before the bloody thieves of the forest be brought to their meritel punishment. Some friendly Indians are said to be fighting bravely on the side of the whites.

Louisiana.

The Lava Beds of The Modoes.

A reporter of the Washington 'Star' had an interview on Friday with Prof. F. V. Hayden, in charge of the United States expedition for the geological survey of the territories, who visited the lava beds in Oregon last year, now occupied by the Modec Indians. These beds are llocated near Rhett and Klamath lakes, not far from the bound ary line between Oregon and California In responce to inquiries, Prof Hayden

. These lava bee's are an outflow of volcanie matter, forming a perfect san of melted rock, which gradually cooled, and in cooling became broken. Isnumerable little streams have worked their way through, and the whole, place is filled with caperas. Oftentimes these caverns connect with each other, and extend for miles under ground. They vary in width from fitty to five or six bundred feet. The entrances to then. are generally very small, so they can eas ly be defendend. The caverns and crevices, which are well supplied with water, are filed with rabbits, lizards, snakes, mice, and all kinds of bugs and

It is impossible to reach the Indiane. These beds are, as it were, a great shell, and treops cannot reach them .-Why, five Indians !ocated there could whip the whole United States army, if they had plenty of ammunition. The only way is to starve them out, but that will take some time, as the e Indians eat roots, snakes, mice, seeds, lizards, &c., and they get a good supply in those beds; but they must come out some time. These Modocs are the same as the Digg r Indians, and live upon all kinds of reptiles. They manage to sew skins together by means of little sinews, and thus make their cloth-

The lava beds comprise from 5) to 100 square miles, probably. Indeed, the whole country there is about the

There is a possibility of the Indians getting out, as they have thoroughly explored every part, and are familiar with every passige. It will be a difficuit thing to surround them, and there is great danger of heir

on account of their familiarity with the beds, and the comparative ignorance of our forces as to the exits and interior formation. The Indians know every foot of that country probably, better than you do the city of Washington and herce they have the advantage.

The fragments of lava are from ten to fifty feet in diameter, and generally very angular and sharp and full of holes, rendering it impossible for man to do so. We have had our animals ruined almost by clambering over them for two

The Utes, Saake, Digger, and Modocs are all the same. I have seen them gather bushels of grasshoppers, which they roast, and grind t' im to a powder and make a sort of pudding, upon which they live.

All the bands have half-breeds among them, and they are full of the devil and create more trouble than the regular Indians. You see these half-breeds have all the cunning of the white man and all the treachery of the Indians, -I have no doubt these half breeds have created most of this trouble.

Honor To The Heroic Dead.

We noticed at the Alabama Warehouse a few days ago a large number of new and nearly painted head-boards. prepared at the order of the Ladies' Memorial Association of Columbus, to mark the last resting places of those immortal heroes whose Lones now moulder beneath the sod in our own beautiful cometery. The work of putting these boards in place has been commenced preparatory to the exercises which take place next week.

We are glad to know that the first inspirations of humanity and patrio'ism, which moved our noble ladies to rever ence and perp tuste the memories of their fallen sous, brothers and husbands, immediate'y after the fall of the Confederacy, still prompt and animate te-day. Their was no ephemeral outburst of sentiment, to flicker and expire ere the reverberations of hostile cannon had died away along the mountain slopes, but a deep and allpervading desire to honor for all time the gallant men who laid down their lives even in a hopeless cause for their section. Reverence for our dead, even after they have passed to their reward in the natural way, is one of the tenderest and holiest of emotions; and it to the memory of these we owe so much shall we not yet more delight to honor those who wave thrown themselves into the deadly breach for our deliverance?
