The School Law.

AND DE VILLE At the instance of several persons interested in the administration of the Public School Law new in force in this State, we publish below an abstract of its provisions respecting the qualification, organization, authority and duties of County Examining Board, and Township Committees, and the qualification, payand duti sof Teachers. It is deemed unnecessary to give any synopsis of the sections relating to the County and State Boards of Education, and the County and State Treasurer's as it would be of no practical benefit to those for whose information and guidance this publication is de-

THE BOARD OF COUNTY EXAMINERS.

Sec. 13. Consists of three residents of the County, of good moral character and sujtable attainments, appointed by the County Board of Education, who hold office for one year and until their successors are appointed one of their number being designated as chairman. Vacancies are filled by the appointing Board.

Sec. 14. They are required to examine all applicants, at the Court House, on the first Thursdays of January and July, and from day to day during the remainder of said, weeks if necessary; and they may examine applicants on other days. They shall grant certificates to all whom they shall find to possess sufficient moral and mental qulifications; grading the certificate according to the applicants attainments, as follows : Those qualified to teach the higher branches of English are entitled to the first grade those qualified to teach only the ordinary branches of English, to the second grade; and those only qua ified to instruct primary classes, to the third grade. By direction of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Examiners also note in the certificate, by figures opposite the names of the several branches examined upon, the degree of the applicant's proficiency therein-1 denoting the highest, and 8 the lowest.

These certificates are good for one year only from their date ; and the Board of Examiners is empowered and required to revoke the certificate of any teacher who shall be guilty of any immoral or disreputable conduct, or shall prove neglectful of, or incompetent to discharge the duties of a teach-

Sec. 15. The Board of Examiners shall keep a catalogue of those to whom they have granted certificates, and report annually to the secretary of the County Board and Superintendent of Public Instruction.

THE PAY OF COUNTY EXAMINERS.

Sec. 43. Is two dollars per day each for every day actually engaged in examining teachers, at the times specially mentioned, to-wit : the first Thursday's in January and July, and the Friday's and Saturdays immediately following,-to be paid out of the school fund ; and (by section 15.) every applicant to be examined at any other time, must pay the examiners one dol-

To accommodate those interested, the Board of Examiners of Franklin County, in addition to the days named in the Act, have concerted to meet on the first Saturday of every month. [except January and July,) in the office of W. K. Barham Esq. in the Court House, to examine applicants.

SCHOOL COMMITTEES.

Sec. 16. For each township, are composed of three persons, elected every two years, by the qualified votes of the township ; or in case of failure to have such elections, or in case of a vacancy occurring at any time, the County Board of Education makes the appointment from suitable residents of the township, and the said appointees hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

Soc. 17. The School Committee of each township is a body corporate styled "The School Committe of Township---, in the County of----

In their corporate name they can purchase and hold real and personal property, can sell and transfer the same for school purposes, and can sue and be sucd. All conveyances must be made to them and their successors in

A REAL PROPERTY OF THE PROPERT

Sec. 18. Within fifteen days after their election or appointment, the persons chose shall meet at a convenient place in the township, and organize by electing one of their number chairman, and another, clerk of the School Committee.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF SCHOOL COM-MITTEES.

Sec. 19. Committees of the several townships shall lay off their respective townships into school districts, consulting, as far as practicable, the convenience and wishes of persons interested in the neighborhood, and disregarding township boundaries when convenience requires it. They shall designate the district's by number, as "District No 1. of Township ____." &c., Provided, that where the district lies in two or more townships, it shall be designated as "District No .--," of the township in which the schoolhouse is situated.

Sec. 20. The schools of the two races shall be separate; and the districts may or may not be the same for both; for, in laying off the districts, the convenience of the white residents is to be consulted in regard to those for white schools, and that of colored residents as to those for colored schools. And where there shall be two sets of districts in the same township, they shall be designated as district No. 1, 2, 3, &c., 'for white schools,' or for colored schools," (as the case may be,) of said township.

Sec. 21. The school committee may receive any gift, grant, donation or devise for the use of any school or schools within their jurisdiction; and are interested, in their corporate capacity, with the custody and case of all school property within their jurisdiction, with full power and discretion to control the same for the interest (as they may deem it,) of public education, When the Committee shall deem any school-site no longer necessary for school purposes, they shall re-convey the 1 nd to the original owner, or his heirs or assigns, if he or they so desire. on the payment of first cost, and remove the building therefrom, or sell the same after 20 days advertisement at three public places in the township. Deed's for property thus sold shall be executed by the chairman and clerk; and the proceeds of such sales shall be paid to the township treasurer for the school expenses of township.

CHAPTER CXXXVIII.

AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE COMMIS-S. ONER OF THE COUNTY OF FRANK-IIN TO LEVY A SPECIAL TAX FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE OUTSTAND-ING DEBT OF SAID COUNTY. SECTION 1. The General A sembly

of North Carolina do enact, That the board of commissioners of Franklin county be and they are hereby authorzed in addition to the tax which they may have power to assess, under the general revenue law of the State, to levy a special tax not exceeding onefourth of one per centum on both real and personal property of said county for the year A. D. one thousand eight nendred and seventy-three, for the purpose of paying the ou standing debt of said county jacurred prior to the first day of January, one thousand eight bundred and seventy-three, said tax to be levied and collected as other taxes. SEC. 2. That no tex shall be levied un ler this act until the question shall be su mitted to the qualified voters of the county at an elect on to be held under the direction of the commissioners and approved by a majority of those voting the reon.

Src. 3 That the same amount shall be levied on each taxable poll as is levied on three hand ed dollars' worth

St C. 4. That the taxes levied and collected under this act shall be applied "pro rata" by said commissioners tothe payment of the debts of the said county of Peack in incurred prior to the first day of J. nuary, one thousand eight hundred and seven y-three.

Sic. 5. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

Ratified the 31 day of March, 1873 At the same time and places, polls will be open to vote for or against the Constitutional Amendments proposed by the Legislature, Township officers, to wit: Magistrates, Constables, Clerks and Echool Committees.
