During the reading the pinnioned victims were seated on the platform of the scaffold with their feet on a drop, listening anxiously and of course understanding not a word of it.

The chaplain then offered an earnest and fervid prayer for the culprits, which was listened to attentively. At ten o'clock and fifteen minutes the fatal nooses were placed around their necks under the direction of Capt. Hogg.
