Pittsburgh Calamity.

In the different papers we find ac count of a terrible calamity which be fell the citizens of Pittsburgh on the night of 26th of July. The littsburgh Dispatch thus speaks of it:

"Between 9 and 10 o'clock frequent

and vivid flashes of lightning in the northern heavens, accompanied by terrific peals of thunder, presaged the coming disaster. Momentarily increasing in violence, it was but a few minutes until the streets in many places were impassable; water swept down the gutters like roaring torrents; the broadest avenues were solid sheets of water; while from the hillsides poured a deluge which tore rocks of a ton's weight from their foundations and gashed and seamed the earth as if it had been riven by an earthquake, Nothing could resist the awful volume of rushing, seething water. Substantial brick houses crumbled when it struck them as if they had been made of sand; frame buildings were lifted from their foundations, borne along on the angry current, and dashed pieces against other buildings which vainly obstructed their course. In some instances foundations were undermined and buildings sunk down in sand and debris to the second story .-So resistless was the torrest that nothing in its path escaped destructionhouses, fences, bridges, trees all going down before it, and combining to constitute a scene of ruin such as none had ever witnessed before, and such as we hope we may never look upon

There were more than 200 persons killed - many of them little children. In speaking of the cause of this terrible

calamity the Disputch says. "Though the fall of rain alone would have sufficed to bridg a terrible devastation, it seems to be well authenticated that that the principal cause of the great calamity in this locality was a waterspout of vast proportions which burst upon the hills overlooking the city, and poured down in overwhelming volume through the natural water

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
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
