A MURDER AT WHITAKER'S.—A correspondent of the Norfolk Landmark, writing from Battleboro under date of Wednesday, says:

"Just as I am about to close this article, I received the sad intelligence of the brutal murder of Mr. Cohn, a Jewish merchant, who has been for some time doing business at Whitaker's Depot, a station about five miles north of here. He seems to have had a considerable sum of money in his pocket, and it being known to a party of negroes, they attacked him in the dark last night, murdered him, and took the money and escaped. This is the third murder in my own knowledge at this place within the last few years."

CHRISTMAS TREES.—On Christmas night, the M. E. Sunday School, give for the scholars a Christmas Tree, at the College Chapel, and on Thursday night following, the Episcopalians one for their School. We attended both, and we know of no occasions where we

ever saw more bright happy faces, than at these Christmas trees. Santa Claus ransacked his store house for the prettiest presents and dispersed them to the children with a liberal hand. The trees were both handsomely decorated, and the singing by the little girls and boys was very good, and the Louisville Brass Band, again placed the citizens under obligations to them for excellent music on both occasions. The minister's Rev. M. H. Vaughan of the Episcopal Church, and Rev. F. L. Reid of the M. E. Church, received a number of beautiful presents from the children and teachers of their schools. A number of prizes for good lessons, and punctual attendance to the school's were also given. We are satisfied that these little festive occasions for the children are right, and will have an influence for good to them.

TEMPERANCE CELEBRATION.—On Monday the 28th of December last—The colored members of the order of Good Templars in this place, had quite a festive time, they marched through the principal streets, headed by the Louisville colored band, their regalia was very pretty and their banners, Faith, Hope, and Charity, was gotten up very tastefully, and made a beautiful and impressive scene. After marching through the streets, they repaired to the Court House, where a rostrum, beautifully decorated with evergreens, had been erected, and were addressed by the Rev. F. L. Reid, Rev. W. H. Hester, J. J. Minstree Esq., Capt. J. J. Davis, Rev. C. McCurdy, pastor of the colored Presbyterian Church at this place and Jno. H. Williamson. We are glad to note this sign of advancement among the colored people and we are satisfied that this public demonstration will have a most happy and beneficial effect. The order already numbers about 100 members, and their good influence has been felt during the Christmas holidays, for there was less drunkenness and boisterous conduct on our streets during Christmas than we ever knew before, and we are satisfied that to the Temperance organization, we are largely indebted for this state of things. Go on in your good work, my colored friends, for let me assure you that nothing tends to advance and elevate your race, more than temperance and sobriety. We acknowledge the receipt of an invitation to be present at the temperance supper at night, but other engagements prevented our attending.
