MYORS COURT.—Rufin Foster and Henry Williamson, both colored were before His Honor Mayor Williamson, on Monday last for disturbing the peace and quiet of the town. They were made to contribute \$2.00 each to the town treasury. Rufin was bound over to the next term of the court for resisting the officer.

HORRIBLE SUICIDE.—Mr. Lee Perry, a white man living about two miles from town committed suicide on Wednesday morning last by putting the muzzle of his gun in his mouth and discharging it, the whole load passing out the back of his head. The act was committed in the day time, near the dwelling of his wife's mother, in the public road.

The Commissioners were in session on Monday last, nothing of special interest came up before them. The consideration of the report of the committee to examine the Registers and Poor House books, was postponed until their next regular meeting, this at the request of the Register. Dr. R. H. Timberlake the former Clerk, surrendered the order given him by the Board, as expenses of the office and the former action of the Board was revoked, the matter be taken up at their next meeting on Monday.

QUINTESSENCE OF MEANNESS.—On Tuesday-night, while all honest men were asleep, some fiend in human shape, went to the carriage house of Mr. H. C. Jones, and took Mr. E. D. Watson's buggy out, and with an axe cut all the spokes from the wheels, and splitting the hubs and dash. This we regard as one of the meanest acts that we have ever known committed in our town, and the citizens of the place are justly indignant. The Mayor we understand will call a meeting of the citizens of the town, for the purpose of giving their expression of disapprobation of such conduct, by adopting resolutions and offering a reward for the apprehension of the scoundrel. In our own opinion we do not think that property or life is safe while such a creature runs at large, he ought to be hunted down like Scott Parton or any other Murderer or highway robber. Every effort should be made to hunt the rascal down, and the severest penalty of the law should be served on him.

ESCAPED.—Moses Glenn, a colored boy, who was committed to jail, for larceny, escaped on Monday last, while the jailor was engaged in giving dinner to the other prisoners. He ran by the guard, down to the river, and across one of the guard only firing at him, it is not known whether he was hit or not, his trucks were seen on the edge of the water where he entered the river, but no sign of his having come out.

Since the above was written, the body of the negro has been found, it was discovered by some little boys while in bathing on Thursday. A Coroner's inquest was held over the body and the verdict was, that he came to his death by drowning, there being no signs of shot or bullets.

SEVERELY BITTEN BY DOGS.—Two very large dogs belonging to Mr. J. N. Uzzle of this place, escaped from his yard on Friday night last, and attacked a negro woman on the street biting her very severely on both arms and shoulders. The dogs would probably have killed her but for the timely interference of Mr. Jasper Murphy who hearing the screams of the woman, ran to her assistance, and shot at them several times with his pistol, the dogs took fright and ran home. The same dogs attacked a negro man in Mr. Uzzle's yard on the same evening but were driven off before the man was seriously hurt.

A NORTH CAROLINIAN COMMITS SUICIDE.—A Petersburg (Va.) dispatch, under date of the 28th, thus records the unfortunate death of a young man from this State who was at the time living in that city.

B. W. Avert, a promising young man committed suicide this morning while in delirium from fever, by jumping into the Appomattox river. He left his room without clothing, wrapping a sheet about his body, and ran like mad to the wharf, unmolested by the passers by, although it was broad daylight.

The body was recovered and sent to his relatives in Battleboro, N. C.

SERIOUS AFFRAY.—The Toisnot Transcript says an affray occurred between J. B. Vick and Bennett Bone at Coker's Alley, in Nash, last Sunday morning, during which Bone was seriously, if not fatally injured. We were unable to get the particulars.

CINCINNATI, July 30.—Report of damage to crops from late rains continue from Southern Ohio and Southern Indiana. All report swollen streams, submerged corn and sprouting wheat.
