AN ACT TO ASCERTAIN THE INDEBTEDNESS OF THE DIFFERENT COUNTIES, CITIES AND TOWNS OF THIS STATE, AND TO PRESCRIBE A STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS.

SECTION 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact, That all claims against the several counties, cities and towns of this State, whether by bond or otherwise, shall be presented to the chairmen of the Board of County Commissioners or to the chief officers of said cities and towns as the case may be, within two years after the maturity of such claim or claims, or the holders of such claim or claims shall be forever barred from a recovery thereof.

PROVIDED, That claims which have already matured and become due shall be presented on or before the first of January, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, or the holders thereof shall be forever barred of a recovery thereof. Ratified the 22nd day of March, A. D. 1875.
