We join you friend Joyner in your rejoicing. We are a poor judge of such work, but we hear competent judges say that it is a good substantial bridge. It was built by Whitelaw & Crowder, of Raleigh. Mr. Whitelaw supervising the work.

The Dramatic Entertainment at the College Building on Tuesday night last, for the benefit of the Louisburg Cornet Band, was largely attended by an appreciative audience. We can safely say that we have never seen a crowd more highly delighted and amused.—The characters were ably sustained, and the smiling countenances and broad grins fully attested how well repaid all were who attended. The transformation scene, (if we may so call it) in the play of the "People's Lawyer," surpasses description. Magnificent Oil paintings, overhung with evergreens and flowers of the richest hue, dazzled the eye, while hanging baskets of every shape and design hung from the walls. We did not see where anything was left undone, which we had added beauty to this scene.—An artist was present, and asked permission to Photograph this palace of beauty. To the head who planned and the hands which executed this magnificent, this surpassingly beautiful scene too much credit cannot be given. The young ladies and gentlemen who participated in the entertainment should themselves possess of more than ordinary talent, and when Sidon Elmgie, Mr. Straus, John Schmidt, the pers cutted Dutchman, Chas. Oils, Clearstarch and others, again makes their appearance, may we be present to see them. Could we witness such scenes oftener, we hardly think that we should grow any older.

**A GREAT NUISANCE.**—We believe there is an ordinance in our Town Laws against noisy and boisterous conduct on the streets, in fact we are certain that there is such an ordinance, for on last Thursday we were present at the Mayors Court when a fine of \$5 and cost was imposed for the violation of this same ordinance. It is a good law and we only wish it was enforced more rigidly, for nightly, crowds of negroes assemble on our streets, and make the night hideous with their loud laughing, bawling, dancing, screaming and yelling like wild beasts, to the very great disturbance of those living in the central part of the town. We know that we only have to call the attention of our Mayor to the above nuisance to have a stop put to it. While we are on this subject, we will also mention another grave nuisance; it is that of negroes collecting in large crowds every Sunday on the principle streets, to the very great annoyance of ladies on their way to and from Church, we have frequently seen ladies cross from one side of Main street to the other in order to avoid passing twenty or thirty lounging negroes on the side walk.—This we must say is a gross nuisance and should be remedied. We most earnestly hope that the necessity for ever again referring to this subject, will not arise.

# AN ACT TO ASCERTAIN THE INDEBTEDNESS OF THE DIFFERENT COUNTIES, CITIES AND TOWNS OF THIS STATE, AND TO PRESCRIBE A STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS.

SECTION 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact, That all claims against the several counties, cities and towns of this State, whether by bond or otherwise, shall be presented to the chairmen of the Board of County Commissioners or to the chief officers of said cities and towns as the case may be, within two years after the maturity of such claim or claims, or the holders of such claim or claims shall be forever barred from a recovery thereof.  
Provided, That claims which have already matured and become due shall be presented on or before the first of January, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, or the holders thereof shall be forever barred of a recovery thereof.  
Ratified the 22nd day of March, A. D. 1875.

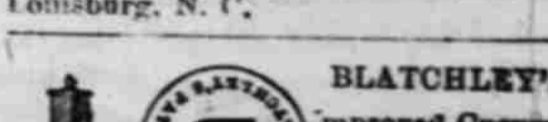
