POSTAL REGULATION. - Parties taking newspapers from the office, are reshousible secording to the postal law fer the amount of subscription. If personner is sent to a party and is not wanted, the proper way is to re fuse to take it from the office. then becomes the postmaster's dut to return it to the publisher. It is also the post masters duty to notify the publishers when a person, on account of remeval ar other cause, fails to take his paper from the office for four weeks in succession. The above duties are prescribed by the Post Office Law and Regulations.


