POSTAL REGULATION.—Parties taking newspapers from the office, are responsible according to the postal law, for the amount of subscription. If a newspaper is sent to a party and is not wanted, the proper way is to refuse to take it from the office. It then becomes the postmaster's duty to return it to the publisher. It is also the postmaster's duty to notify the publishers when a person, on account of removal or other cause, fails to take his paper from the office for four weeks in succession. The above duties are prescribed by the Post Office Law and Regulations.

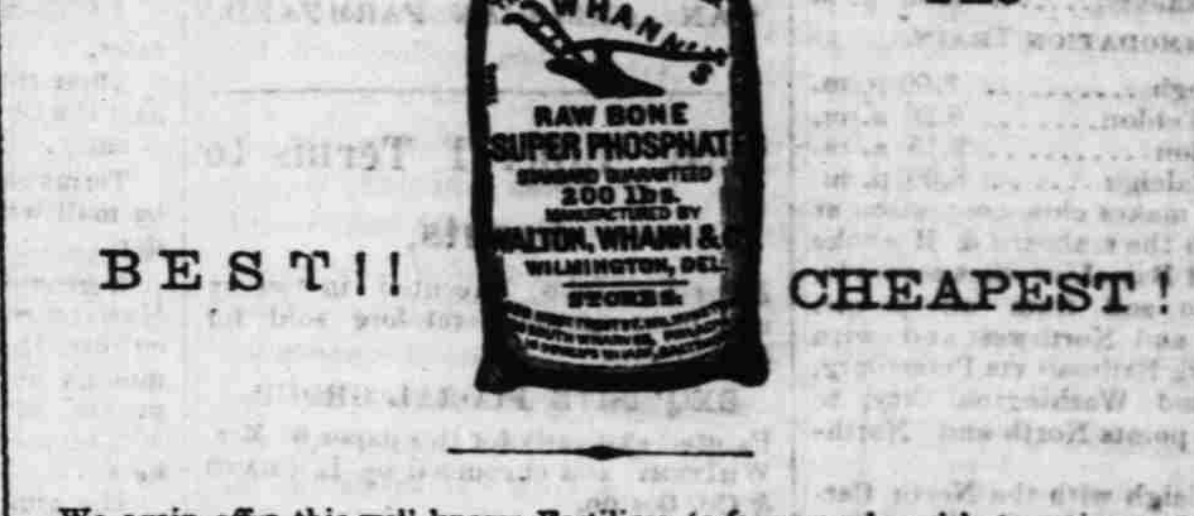
