"WHEREAS, In the judgment of the stockholders of the Carolina Narrow Guage Railroad Company, in convention assembled, it is manifestly for the interest of said corporation to consolidate with the Chester and Lenoir Narrow Guage Railroad Company, a corporation chartered by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, for the construction of a Narrow Guage Railroad from the Town of Chester, in said State of South Carolina, to the

the Town of Dallas, in the State of North Carolina, Be it, therefore, Resolved, That the capital stock of the Carolina Narrow Guage Railroad Company the Chester and Lenoir Narrow Guage Railroad Company, and that the corpora-tion formed by the consolidation of the two said Companies, shall be known as "The Chester and Lenoir Narrow Guage

Railroad Company. Resolved, That the basis of consolidation of the two corporations, shall be that of perfect equality in the value of the shares of their capital stock, and that the subscribers to the capital stock of the Carolina Narrow Guage Railroad Company, shall receive certificates of stock in the consolidated Company, when they shall have paid up their subscriptions.

Resolved, That all the obligations




