We, S. N. Morgan, W. M. Hinton and A. L. Pendleton, the candidates for the Office of Representative in the next General Assembly of N. C., do agree and by these presents, do agree and bind ourselves, each for himself, that whichever is nominated by the County Democratic Convention held in and for said County of Pasquotank on Oct. 4, 1902, that he will, if nominated and elected, introduce and use all proper means to pass an Act in the said General Assembly to submit the question of LICENSE or NO LICENSE to the voters of Pasq. Co., on the 1st Tuesday in August, in the year 1903. Said Act shall be so drawn, introduced and passed that the voters of Pasq. Co., may say by a majority vote whether or not there shall be any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors sold in said county, and that, if a majority of votes cast be against license then there shall be no license issued for the sale of any kind of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors anywhere in said county, but if a majority be cast in favor of license then the County Commissioners of said county may issue license for sale of said spirituous, vinous or malt liquors.

We enter into this agreement as we understand to promote harmony in the Democratic Party and for the general good of the County and State.

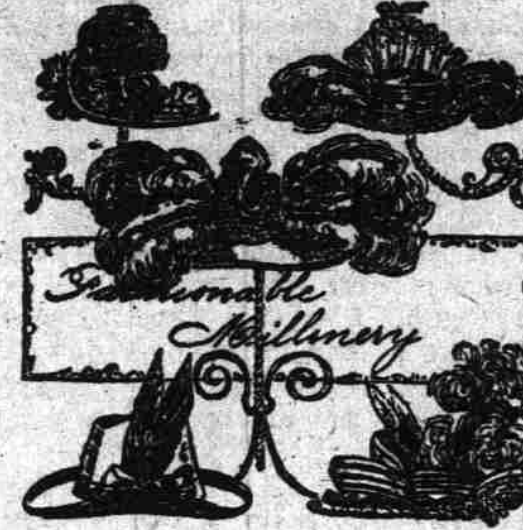
