M.; first permanest settlement." etc. Everybody knows that the Spaniards had nect with excursion train for Norfolk, long before secured a foothold on the Va. southern coast, that Sir Walter Raleigh had sent a party to what is now Carolina which perished there some years previous to the arrival of John Smith and his company on the shores of the Powhatan, and that in 1605 a futile attempt was made under the leadership of Sir John Popham to establish a colony on the coast of maine The point is that none o fthe English enterprises prior to that at Jamestown and so that from the latter ensuet the mastership of he new lant by the Anglo-Saxon race ant the consequent establishment of religious and political liberty. Historical authorities all agree that had the Jamestown experiment failed, on top of the Roanoke tragedy and the Maine fizzle, the spirit or adventure among Englishmen of that day would not have sought further indulgence of the spirit of exploitation in this direction, and that dominion of the continent would have shared betwee nthe French on the north and the Spaniard on the south.
