Carnegie, who is president of the Peace congress, tonight gave out a statement as to the results of the congress just closed. Although not so designated by Carnegie, the statement constitutes a reply to some of the suggestions contained in the letter which President Justice is secured through arbitration, either by court or by tribunal, never by one of the parties sitting as judge in his own cause.

"Third—It is neither peace nor justice, but righteousness that shall exalt the nation. "Answer—righteousness is simply doing what is right. What is just always right; what is unjust is always wrong. It being the first principle of justice that man shall not be judged in their own cause to refuse to sub-

IAN MACLAREN DIES OF BLOOD POISON IN IOWA.

Burlington, Iowa, May 9.—Dr. John Watson—Ian MacLaren—died at 11:15 a. m. today at Mount Pleasant, Iowa. The cause was blood poisoning from tonsillitis.

Doctor Watson came to Mount Pleasant on April 23 from Minneapolis to deliver a lecture. En route Doctor Watson became ill and was compelled to cancel the lecture.

Last Monday and Tuesday the patient was able to be up and around and transact business. Wednesday an abscess formed on the right ear, and in twenty-four hours developed serious symptoms.

Blood poisoning set in. On Saturday another abscess started to form in the left ear and throat.

The patient's condition was aggravated by a bad attack of rheumatism. His wife, who was his constant companion in his last illness, left the room at 11 o'clock this morning. She was gone about fifteen minutes and returning found her husband lifeless.

Doctor Watson was born at Morningtree, Essex, England, November 2, 1850. He was ordained a minister in 1875.

He was appointed Lyman Beecher lecturer at Yale University in 1896, and was made minister of Setton Park Presbyterian church, Liverpool, in 1898.

Among the publications of "Ian MacLaren" were "Beside the Bonnie Briar Bush," "The Days of Auld Lang Syne," "A Doctor of the Old School," etc. Among the works signed John Watson were "The Mind of the Master," "The Cure of Souls," "The Potter's Wheel," "Companions of the Sorrowful Way," "The Life of the Master," "Doctrines of Grace," "Homely Virtues" and "The Inspiration of Faith."

BEST BE THE TIES THAT BIND.

Virginian-Pilot.)

The Charlotte Chronicle is respectfully reminded that no well-informed person in Virginia ever claimed that the debarcation at Jamestown was "The first landing in America," or even that it was the first landing of Englishmen in America, or even that it was the first attempt of Englishmen to colonize the country. The official designation of the Jamestown Exposition is to commemorate "The Ter-Centennial of the landing of the first permanent settlement," etc. Everybody knows that the Spaniards had long before secured a foothold on the southern coast, that Sir Walter Raleigh had sent a party to what is now Carolina which perished there some years previous to the arrival of John Smith and his company on the shores of the Powhatan, and that in 1605 a futile attempt was made under the leadership of Sir John Popham to establish a colony on the coast of Maine. The point is that none of the English enterprises prior to that at Jamestown and so that from the latter ensued the mastership of the new land by the Anglo-Saxon race and the consequent establishment of religious and political liberty. Historical authorities all agree that had the Jamestown experiment failed, on top of the Roanoke tragedy and the Maine fizzle, the spirit of adventure among Englishmen of that day would not have sought further indulgence of the spirit of exploitation in this direction, and that dominion of the continent would have shared between the French on the north and the Spaniard on the south. These things are, all matters of authentic record and furnish no cause for jealousy and no ground for dispute, any more than a child should either deny or resent the fact that its mother was older than itself. Maine and Carolina were both originally contained within the territory chartered to Virginia and the first successful settlement in Carolina was made by emigrants from Virginia and sustained through its infancy by the guardianship of the authorities of the parent colony.
